**Work of C. D. A. Lauded At Detroit Convention**

D. TROTT Miss Mary McKough of Rutland Vermont national chairman of the department of Social Welfare of the Catholic Daughters of America speaking before the eighteenth biennial convention of the C. D. A. on Wednesday, made known the report of the national survey of the social service work of the Catholic Daughters. It embraces all branches of social service work and program for the betterment of society in general.

Miss McKough commended the members of the organization on the amount of work they have accomplished in all sections of the country. Twenty-one projects are now being sponsored by the C. D. A. of one of the jobs works being for the care and health of mothers and babies. This particular project is being carried on by providing pre-natal clinics, hospitalization, home nursing and hospitalities.

At School Children

Another important undertaking is the clinic for children of pre-school age who are afflicted with rickets and special diet for those undernourished. For the school child, school books, tuition, transportation, health clinics, school lunches, special diets for diabetic and tubercular children.

Christmas projects provide for both children and adults with food, clothing and toys, entertainment for underprivileged children of the community, special entertainments for children detained in institutions.

The continued interest on the part of individuals and private agencies for the underprivileged is one means of keeping alive the old-fashioned spirit of neighborliness.

Miss McKough said "The federal, state and municipal welfare agencies are doing a great good in taking care of these people in want, but we must not lose sight of the fact that there is still much work for the private agencies and we are urging over 200,000 members to assist their program for the service of God, country and suffering humanity."

Combat Delinquents

The results of the survey shows on the part of the members their interest in delinquency. They are acting as friends and visitors to those detained in state institutions and have acted as counselors following the discharge of delinquents from public institutions.

Medical projects for adults include special work for the blind, the crippled, the tubercular, prevention and care of cancer.

The survey shows the activity of the members in community projects, study of resources for the moral and physical well-being of the community at large and particular attention has been given for better recreational and library facilities. In many cases the local Courts of the Catholic Daughters have provided for Christian burial.

**'Fake' Says Tunney Of Red Building**

NEW YORK (NC) - Gene Tunney, former world's heavyweight champion, writing in America, Jesuit weekly review July 8 issue, assails the Soviet building at the New York World's Fair as "a ludicrous pavilion which 'creates more ill will for the F. R. management among true Americans than if they had engaged a group of muckers for each exit to slap the face of every religionist as he left the grounds'."

Mr. Tunney's article, entitled "The Ruby Star Atop a Colossal Soviet Fake," sees the Soviet pavilion as an irreparable mistake which, he says, he regrets as much for the management as "the poor deluded ones who have been, and are to be taken in by this gigantic fraud—the sour note in a pleasant symphony of imagination, education and amusement."

Leaving the building "and again entering America," says Mr. Tunney, "one's first impulse is for a breath of fresh air, which one ponders how a colossal fake like the Soviet Pavilion was ever allowed to be built on American territory." "For here is an edifice built by a Government whose only purpose in building it to spread the type of propaganda that would lead to the overthrow peacefully or by violence of our American form of government. This Soviet Government whose agents are the self-confessed bank robbers who carried out the revolution of Kerensky, the same gang of no-minded gentlemen who started to death three to five million Russians in Russia during the winter of 1932-33 who have conducted the endless purge, taking countless thousands of lives in Russia and out of it and who have just finished looting the Spanish people of \$338,000,000 in gold and heaven knows how much in works of art while pretending to protect them from Fascism. These same humanitarians of their agents are the deal with the management of the World of Tomorrow for the space and building they have erected. All America is asking 'How come?'"

**Youth Program Set**

The fight to have the Congress take a firm stand against Communism was easily the high-spot of the convention. This fight began when six prominent New York men called on the Congress to rid itself of its alleged Communist control.

Statement by Officials

Two other statements, one by members of the New York State Legislature and the Secretary of State for New York and the other by 16 members of the New York City Council and the City Clerk, also demanded that the Congress record itself against Communism as it has against Nazism and Fascism.

The first test of the movement to force a show-down on the issue of Communism within the Congress was when Murray Plavner of the Youth Council for American Democracy and a founder of the Provisional Committee and Alfred M. Lillenthal, President of the First Voters League of New York attempted to introduce their anti-Communist resolution at the second session of the convention.

The resolution was not permitted to be voted on at either the panel on Interfaith and Interracial Understanding or another panel on Politics and Government. At the latter panel a motion was passed to send the resolution to the Resolutions Committee for consideration.

Communists Fight Resolution

Presented to the delegates at a general session the following day the resolution was opposed by Carl Ross, head of the Young Communist League, one of the dominant groups in the Congress, and other Left Wing delegates. It was defended by Mr. Plavner, Mr. Lillenthal, William B. Ball of Cleveland, President of the Young Americanist League, and "Tony" Cardini, Chairman of the Young Latin American League.

Mr. Cardini was attacked by other delegates as an anti-Semite and a member of the Christian Front organizations favorable to Father Coughlin, charges which he immediately denied. He charged the attack was "a red herring to defeat the resolution."

When finally put to a vote, the resolution was defeated by a large majority. Mr. Ball then rose and led about 20 delegates out of the convention hall to an adjoining hotel where the anti-Communist bloc had established headquarters.

Armed by the resultant unfavorable publicity, an alternative resolution was hastily prepared and submitted by the Resolutions Committee at the next general session. This resolution condemned Communist, Fascist, Nazi and other forms of dictatorship, and was passed almost unanimously by the convention.

**Seminarians Open New Store For Poor**

YONKERS Another store for the poor here has been opened by seminarians of St. Joseph's Seminary, Dunwoodie and a group of Catholic laymen.

The purpose of the store is to provide clothing and shoes for the poor without distinction as to race, color or creed. This is the second store opened by the sponsors in two and a half years.

American Priest Is New India Ordinary

ROME The Rev. Louis Lavoire Morrow of the Salesian Society an American-born priest has been appointed Bishop of Krishnagar, India. Born in Texas in 1892 he is also a Mexican extraction. For the past 16 years he has been private secretary of His Excellency the Most Rev. William Plant, Apostolic Delegate to the Philippine Islands.
