Novena Honors Pastors — Cooperatives
Parish League — Off For Coast

Co-operatives Shown Effecting Justice

"Unless we change man's way of thinking, we cannot bring about that era of Social Justice we all hope for. The co-operative movement affords the technique by which Christian teaching may be put into the economic sphere."

This was the message left with 300 members of the Social Justice Club of Rochester by Joseph H. Gervais, secretary of the Tennessee Co-operative Society, Inc. of Knoxville speaking at the monthly meeting Monday evening in Old St. Mary's Church Hall.

Taking issue with Elliot Roosevelt's charges of anti-Semitism made against Father Coughlin, Bernard Plonch, vice-president of the club stated: "Father Coughlin is not anti-Semitic. No Catholic can be Father Coughlin has never attacked the Jews as a race. He has opposed only unscrupulous and atheistic Jews and Gentiles as well, who are identified with Communism."

Common Good Aim

Quoting Pope Pius XI that "it is of the very essence of social justice to demand from each individual all that is necessary for the common good." Mr. Gervais explained how consumers co-operation helped to bring this about.

He cited the story of 28 weavers in Rochdale, England, who in 1824 pooled their savings of \$330 to begin a movement which in 1934 did a retail business of \$1,000,000.

"In doing so," he said, "they have secured ownership for the workmen of England thousands of retail stores, hundreds of warehouses and shipping centers, steam ships, tea plantations, grain elevators, furniture factories and a host of other productive enterprises. They have transformed what would be the profits of private business into their savings."

"And yet, they have done nothing more than build a great business organization owned and run by the working people. The people of Nova Scotia have shown that they were wanting in one important matter. That matter is education. Nova Scotia uses co-operative enterprise as a means evolved by patient study of the causes which enslaved them in a numbing poverty. They are now building their co-operative stores, fish factories, credit unions and houses. But they are also building a society in which every man has dignity in which every man is his brother's keeper. They have learned that their neighbor's troubles are their troubles. That they can give no one a bad deal without doing injury to society as a whole and hence to themselves. That there is no such thing as shared trading."

The speaker told of the parish credit unions organized in three of the city's parishes and of the growth of the Genesee Co-operative Society, pointing out that though their beginnings were small their progress has been steady.

"The credit unions," he said, "show that the people can conduct their own small banking affairs. They can accumulate their own cash reserves and use them for the aid of their less fortunate brethren. By lending money on the basis of what a man is instead of what he has they are introducing into modern society a measure of value that has been lost since the middle ages."
