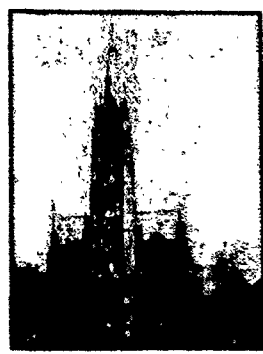

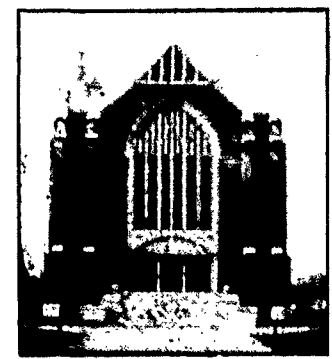

BAZAAR ARRANGEMENTS

All things are in readiness for the 1933 Bazaar which will take place Friday and Saturday July 28 and 29. The church hall has been early decorated in preparation for this event. All members of the parish will be considered Patrons and Patronesses of the bazaar. Door prizes will be awarded on Friday and Saturday to those who qualify.

There will be a meeting of all workers for the bazaar on next Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock. Final arrangements for the location of the various booths and concessions and the assigning of workers to their positions will be completed at this time.

The Feast of St. Anne falls on Wednesday of next week. Masses will be at 6:30, 7 and 8 o'clock. Many have shown their devotion to St. Anne by visiting her shrine at Beauport. We can join our prayers with these people who have made the pilgrimage by assisting at Mass in her honor.

Good St. Anne through the power of her intercession has brought spiritual and material help to multitudes. A special prayer to St. Anne will be included in the Perpetual Novena services in honor of the Sacred Heart of Jesus to be held next Thursday afternoon and evening.

Promptness of the parishioners in paying their pew rent is an indication that the envelope system is proving successful. The death of Matthew Sullivan, who was buried during the last week from Corpus Christi Church, closed the career of one of the oldest members of the parish.

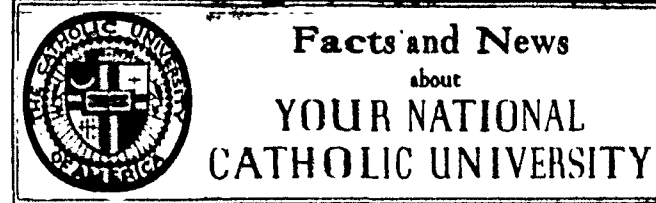

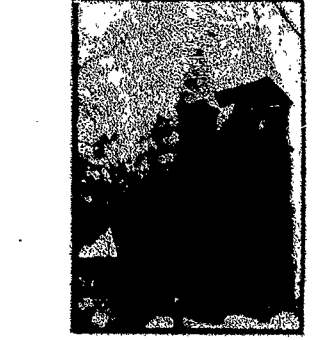
