Corpus Christi Parish BAZAAR ARRANGEMENTS

All things are in readiness for the 1933 Bazaar which will take place Friday and Saturday July 28 and 29. The Church hall has been fully decorated in preparation for this event.

All members of the parish will be considered Patrons and Patronesses of the bazaar. Door prizes will be awarded on Friday and Saturday to those who qualify.

There will be a reading of all workers for the bazaar on next Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock. Final arrangements for the location of the various booths and concessions and the assigning of workers to their positions will be completed at this time.

The Feast of St. Anne falls on Wednesday of next week. Masses will be at 8, 9, 7 and 8 o'clock. Many have shown their devotion to St. Anne by visiting her shrine at Beaupre. We can join our prayers with these people who have made the pilgrimage by assisting at Mass in her honor.

Good St. Anne through the power of her intercession, has brought spiritual and material help to multitudes. A special prayer to St. Anne will be included in the Perpetual Novena masses in the Sacred Heart of Jesus, to be held next Thursday afternoon and evening.

Promptness of the parishioners in paying their pew rent is an indication that the envelope system is proving successful. The parishioners enclose in one of the special envelopes the amount of their rent and indicate the quarter which is to be paid. The envelope is then dropped in the collection basket on Sunday.

This system makes it unnecessary to the new holder to lose valuable time by waiting his turn at the pew rent office.

The Coal Collection has been postponed until August. The last Sunday in July is usually the Sunday for the second Coal Collection of the year.

The coal bill is so large an item that it calls for two collections, the first in January and the second in July. This year, however, the second collection will be taken up on the second Sunday of August.

The new Baptists have been completed and was used for the first time last Sunday. The Baptistry was given in memory of Mr. Michael Naughton and Mrs. Emily Anderson Naughton by their children.

The Rev. Wm. Naughton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Naughton and Procurator of St. Bernard's Seminary, officiated in the new Baptistry last Sunday when five children were presented for Baptism. The dedication and blessing of the Baptistry will take place at a later date.

The installation is a work of art that has been looked after by Mr. Herman Butler Church Artist. The real work in wrought iron and the wrought iron work on the Baptistry font is the work of a local artist.

We feel that the Baptistry is a valuable addition to the equipment of Corpus Christi Church and we are grateful to the members of the Naughton family who donated it.

The death of Matthew Sullivan, who was buried during the last week from Corpus Christi Church, closed the career of one of the oldest members of the parish.

Mr. Sullivan was one of the group who went to Bishop McQuaid early in 1888 to ask him to establish a parish in this vicinity. The distance from the Mother parish, St. Mary's, made it difficult for the parishioners in the district to fulfill their Sunday obligation of hearing Mass and a school near there was needed for the convenience of the children.

Bishop McQuaid was so impressed by the work of this group that Father Leary was sent to visit Mr. Sullivan at his home on Fairmount Street to discuss with him the plans that soon led to the establishment of Corpus Christi Parish.

Facts and News about YOUR NATIONAL CATHOLIC UNIVERSITY

THE UNIVERSITY MUSEUM

Founded primarily to educate and instruct, rather than to amuse or to serve as a means of recreation, the Museum at The Catholic University of America has served its purpose admirably since it was first organized by the Rev. Fr. Magr. Henry Hyvernat, C. A. R., Professor of Biblical Archaeology and Professor of Semitic Languages and Literatures.

Three decades ago, the museum was located in what were spacious quarters in M. Mahon Hall, the main lecture and administration building on the University Campus. The collections now crowd every corner and fill several reserve storerooms. By changing the exhibits and occasionally shifting the cases and cabinets, a fair amount of the available material may be exhibited by means of a rotation procedure. The full display of the treasures which have been gathered by faithful friends and benefactors of the University awaits the day when their proper care and housing.

In a University the Museum takes an active part in the educational program. To the general public the museum usually conveys a happy impression of the museum of science and industry where motion is the rule. Museums in general must cultivate the interest of the public but in a University, the schools and departments draw upon the materials housed in the museum to supplement the work of the classroom.

The museum has been a constructive participant in the daily life of the professional and student bodies. Serves Purpose.

While the Museum at The Catholic University is not a large one, it is interested in the scheme of the University.

Friends, professors, benefactors, other museums, colleges and universities, the various departments of the Government and learned societies have been studying the errors of Communism for six months.

The organization already has 3,600 members in the Federal District and more than 10,000 elsewhere in Mexico. Senorita Julieta Maldonado is president of the League.
