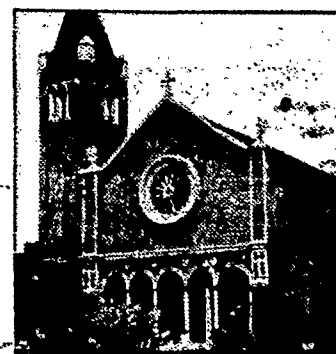

The attraction known as "Variety Gambol" is scheduled to be presented at Roseland Park on Monday July 31 to Sunday August 6.

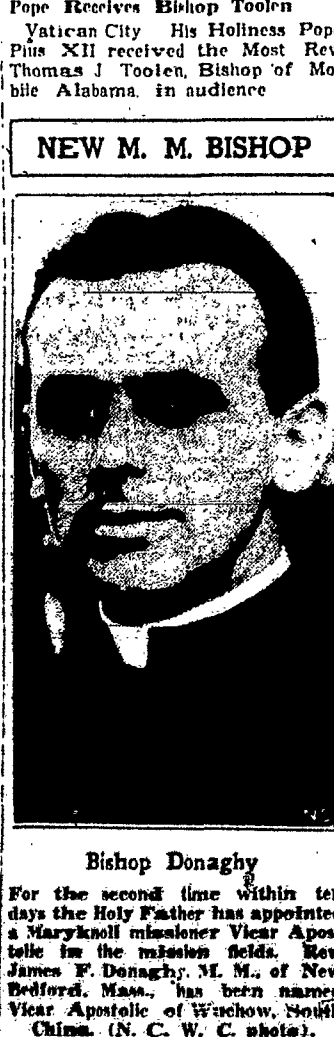
Bouncing about the stage in a rapid and sensational manner the Variety Gambol, four men and three girls are sure to bounce right into the lead as an outstanding attraction.

Vacation School Pupils To Sing At Mass, First Time

Singing of Gregorian music at Mass, Sunday, for the first time by any of the religious vacation schools in the diocese, will mark the formal closing of the summer school term at St. Francis Xavier's parish.

The Mass will be celebrated at 9:10 A. M. Sunday, July 30, in St. Francis Xavier's Church, Bay Street, corner Teresa Street.

The children will be heard singing in the approved manner, the "Kyrie," "Fidelis Angelicus," "Stabat," "Agnus Dei" and closing with "Holy God."

Supervising the children, 214 of whom registered for this year's work, was the Rev. Patrick A. Schaff, pastor of St. Francis Xavier's Church, together with his assistants, the Rev. Albert L. Stonetti and the Rev. David B. Singerhoff.

Particular emphasis upon the training of the boys and girls in approved Church music was placed by the Sisters of St. Joseph in charge of the school, during this term. The demonstration Sunday of what has been accomplished will be listened to intently by interested in the children from the public schools who attended the course, their parents and friends.

Project work in line with that carried on in the religious vacation schools was carried out at St. Francis Recreation; properly supervised rounded out the program which has advanced the pupils with marked strides in the practice of their religion.

St. Patrick's Draws 350

Playlets based on projects worked out in their courses brought out in their courses brought out one of the most successful religious vacation school courses conducted at St. Patrick's Church, Plymouth Avenue North, to a close on Wednesday evening this week.

The summer school at St. Patrick's enrolled 350 boys and girls from the public schools nearby.

In addition to the playlets, in which the children's capable efforts were dramatized, there was a series of exhibits of hand-work, and a series of projects in general Woodworking projects were worked out during the course and all projects were correlated with class instruction.

Each morning the classes had one-half hour instruction in religion with the Rev. Leo C. Moore, pastor of St. Patrick's, in charge, assisted by the Rev. James F. O'Connell and the Rev. John D. Malley.

The religious vacation school at St. Patrick's was directed by Sister Thomas Augustine, M.S.S.R., co-operating with the capable Trinitarian Sister who is a staff of it including students from St. Margaret's, St. Ann's, St. Anthony's Academy, Our Lady of Mercy High School and Aquinas Institute.

Each Wednesday and Friday Mass was celebrated for the pupils and they prayed the Mass and sang appropriate hymns.

Fifty Years at Molokai

While the Catholic World is observing the fiftyth anniversary of the death of Father Damien, hero priest of Molokai, there are perhaps but few Americans who know that it was an American sisterhood who assisted in the spiritual preparation of this noble soul. The "Annales des Soeurs Coeurs" have just published an account of this fact together with other interesting details which will undoubtedly interest our readers.

It was in 1853 that Rev. Leonard Foucault, provincial of Hawaii, was asked by King Kalanikouhi to find nuns to care for the lepers on Molokai. He knoed of the fact of a group of fifty communities, until at last he met at Syracuse, New York State, the generous soul of Mother Marianne, provincial of the Franciscan Sisters of the Holy Family, who went to his cause. Mother Marianne left that very year with Sisters Bonaventure, Crescente, Renee Rosalie Antonella and Leopoldine. Sister Leopoldine arrived there the following year. Arrived at Honolulu they were obliged to remain there for a period of five years before they were authorized to go to Molokai. Sister Marianne and her years in caring for isolated cases of leprosy, and founded the hospital at Waiuku. It was not until November 13, 1888 that Sister Marianne and Sisters Crescente and Leopoldine arrived at Molokai.

Sister Leopoldine, who spent 40 years on the island now views only with joy and happiness the years of devotion and sacrifice spent among the lepers and claims that these were the happiest years of her whole life. During an interview granted recently this good religious stated: "How privileged I have been able to work under the direction of Father Damien, the most saintly man I have ever met and with Mother Marianne, the most lovable and tender person I have ever known and with Sister Crescente, whom I consider a saint." In describing the first meeting with the leper priest Sister Leopoldine quoted "Father Damien's words: 'Now I can die in peace.' For many years I have prayed for sisters to take care of our poor lepers." She also described a touching scene which occurred just before the missioner's death. "One day he showed me his half-burnt church and told me that he would never be able to finish it. Understanding that he was announcing to us his approaching end, I began to weep. However, he reproved me for this, sweetly and jokingly. 'Hiccup forlitude this displayed by a martyr who willingly sacrifices himself for the outcasts of humanity!'"

The Catholic Church in Japan

One of the most dramatic of all the thrilling chapters in the history of the Catholic Church is the story of the introduction of Christianity into Japan. In that story also there is no incident more colorful than the martyrdom of the six CHRISTIANS OF NAGASAKI.

The reasons for the persecution of Christianity by rulers who had previously been fairly favorable to the new religion lie deep in the traditions and character of the Japanese. St. Francis Xavier's entrance into the island Empire in 1549 marked the beginning of a half century of struggle which was eminently successful. His Jesuit confreres were followed by Franciscans; many of the Japanese people, rulers and nobles as well as the masses, were converted. They were enthusiastic in their adoption of Catholicism. It appeared

that the Church's progress would be swift and unimpeded. However, in 1587 complications set in and before the turn of the century violent persecutions were in order. The fear of invasion was the chief cause of the fire of hatred in those days against the "foreign missionaries." Priests and laymen, Jesuits, Franciscans and devoted sons of St. Ignace willingly gave up their lives that Christ might reign. Their blood watered the seed of faith so thoroughly that a Jesuit missionary, writing about the scene, stated: "The astonishing fruit of the apostolate of our 26 martyrs is that the Christians have been confirmed in the faith and hope of eternal salvation. The very pagans who assisted in the martyrdoms were struck at seeing the joy of the blessed ones as they suffered on their crosses and the courage with which they met death."

The Church is proud of the faith of Japanese Catholics today just as she was proud of the Spanish missionaries who first brought that faith to the island kingdom. A Pides release recently announced that Japanese officials are friendly to Spanish missionaries and further stated: "When Spanish Dominicans working in the district of Yamaguchi, Shikoku, Japan organized a service of thanksgiving for the end of the Civil War in Spain for the first time a number of Japanese officials came to the mission. Speeches were delivered both by the Dominicans and the Japanese. The Japanese officials are recognized for their charity and zeal rather than for their nationality."
