ST. LOUIS.—In connection with the Summer Schools of Catholic Action in Washington, New York and Chicago under the sponsorship of the Queen's Work, organ of the National Sodality, it is announced that the magazine, in celebration of its silver jubilee will appear in new size with its September issue.
