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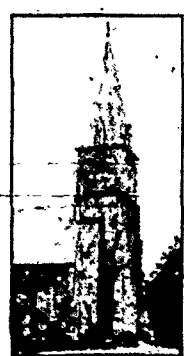

Auriesville Date Set By State K. C.

Inspired and encouraged by success of the first Knights of Columbus pilgrimage to Auriesville, the New York State Council and the Order of the Alambra are planning the second tour on Sunday, September 10.

This pilgrimage to the holy Shrine of the North American Martyr Saints will bring pilgrims and their families and friends from all parts of the State. Special trains will start from New York City and Buffalo on that day arriving at Auriesville in time for Mass.

Directing arrangements for the pilgrimage which brought out over 5,000 men, women and children last year, are State Deputy Joseph F. Lamb of the K. of C. and George A. Timone, Chairman, Catholic Affairs Committee of the State K. C. Council.

State Deputy Lamb in a message to members and friends said this week:

"The tour is one that should appeal to every Catholic American, particularly the residents of the Empire State, the scene of the martyrdom of the first three Saints in what is now the United States.

It emphasizes the Catholic influence in the foundation of America. The recent unveiling of the statue of St. Isaac Jogues, the great Ambassador of Peace, at Lake George as well as the rapid progress toward the canonization of Katherine Tekakwitha, the Lily of the Mohawks, are additional reminders of the timeliness of this occasion.

A Low Mass at 12:25 P. M. will open the services at Auriesville Stations of the Cross and Benediction are on the program. Special round-trip pilgrimage fares have been arranged. 4,253 Persons Enroll In Adult Classes

With a total of 4,253 persons enrolled, Adult Summer School School reached an all-time high in July according to the monthly report just issued by the WPA Adult Education Division of the Board of Education. This compares with a total registration of 2,574 for the same period last year, an increase of 1,659 enrollees.

The homemaking classes lead all others with 1,762 persons enrolled, for an increase of 1,035 registered for the same period last year. Next highest in class registrations were the music classes with a total of 553 for an increase of 249 over 1938.
