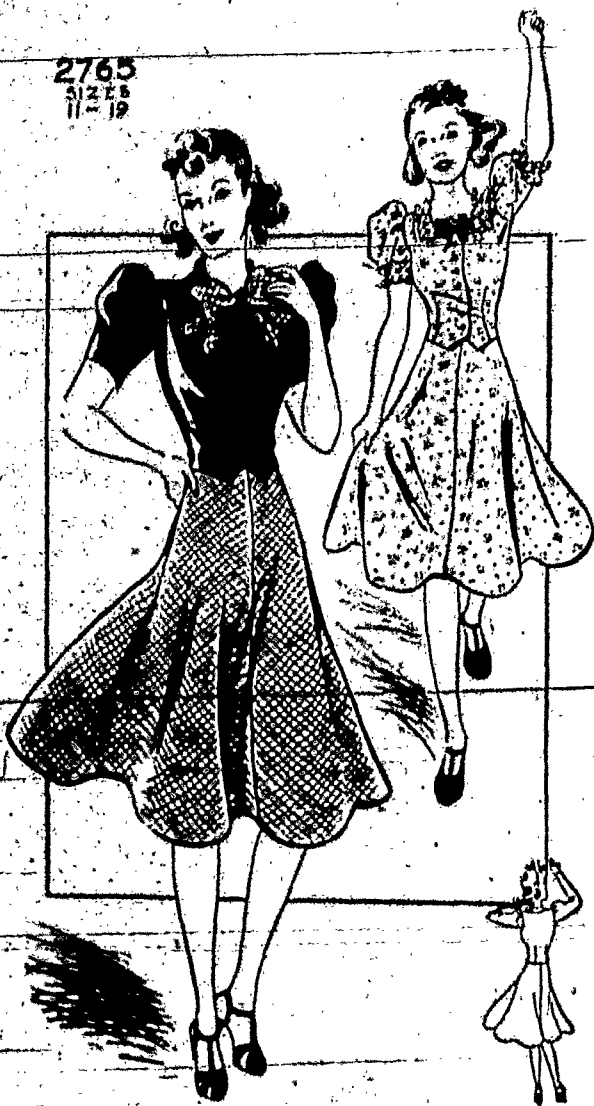

Rochester Diocesan Council N. C. C. W. 536 Columbus Civic Center

You will be interested to know that the round-trip, coach-intermediate fare from Rochester, N. Y. to San Francisco and return is only \$96.50. This ticket permits the use of coach accommodations from Rochester to Chicago and return, and tourist sleeping-car accommodations from Chicago to San Francisco and return, upon payment of the Pullman car charge. For example, the cost of a "challenger" or tourist lower berth from Chicago to San Francisco is \$8.95, and the same amount returning.

As many will not be able to attend our National Convention in San Francisco, we call your attention to some of the highlights of the Convention. Most important in every convention day is that first morning hour when preachers gather for common prayer. Humbly seek divine guidance in their deliberations and blessings on their work, and participate in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.

Truly outstanding will be the Solemn Pontifical High Mass at the Cathedral of St. Mary, celebrated by His Excellency the Most Rev. John J. Altzy, Archbishop of San Francisco. Our host on Sunday morning will be our privilege to hear that renowned speaker, His Excellency, the Most Rev. Duane G. Hunt, Bishop of Salt Lake, who will deliver the sermon on this occasion.

The afternoon will close with Benediction at the Mission Dolores Church, erected in 1776 by the Franciscan Missionaries who established the great chain of missions ranging from San Diego to 100 miles north of San Francisco.

Because of many matters of importance to the conduct of the National Council must be discussed and acted upon at the yearly meeting, a definite part of the program is devoted to business.

Outstanding therefore, on this program, will be an address on Sunday evening by the Rt. Rev. Magr. Michael J. Reedy, General Secretary of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, who will discuss this organization of the Bishops of the United States, from which we received our charter to federate the Catholic women organizations in this country, of which we are an integral part and to which we constantly look for guidance and assistance in all our various activities.

On the following day staff members of the various departments of the N.C.C.W. will take part in a panel discussion, each outlining the work of his department, and indicating what contribution they make to Catholic work and in what way they can be of service to the individual organizations affiliated with N.C.C.W.

Nearer home the quarterly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Rochester Diocesan Council, N.C.C.W. will be held in Geneva, N. Y. on September 9, the same date as the opening of the San Francisco National Convention. At the Geneva meeting, V. F. will celebrate Mass, Francis de Sales Church at 9:00 A. M. and our members and friends are invited to attend. Following the Directors Meeting a luncheon will be held at the Seaton Hotel at 12:15 P. M. Tickets are \$1.00.

The afternoon meeting which will immediately follow the luncheon is open to all who wish to attend, whether or not they belong to affiliated societies.
