"Above all, he concluded, "it is a task which needs the cooperation of the entire Church." . . . "THE WORKERS ARE FEW," Father Mann launched the idea of a Missionary Union of the Clergy.

It is the Union of priests the world over, united for the purpose of encouraging prayer for the missions, mission knowledge and mission vocations as well as a mission support. The Missionary Union members are to offer the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass once a year for the missions. It requests him to give frequent remembrance of the missions in his Divine Office and daily prayers, and to stimulate the laity to pray for the missions. It further asks the priests to deepen their knowledge of the missions and to impart this knowledge to those under their care, to encourage vocations to the missions.

"LET NOT THE SUN GO DOWN UPON YOUR ANGER"
It is said of St. John the Patriarch of Alexandria, commonly called the Almoner, on account of his extraordinary charities, that he was converted by his meekness, and by his sweet and amiable disposition converted his bitterest opponents into his warmest friends and supporters. He had recourse to Nicetas, the governor of the city, in behalf of the poor of his flock, who were in danger of being grievously afflicted by an oppressive tax which it was proposed to levy on them.

He was, however, received with great coldness and even with insult, for the governor being prejudiced against St. John by certain rumors which had reached his ear, instead of listening to him with the respect to which his sacred character and eminent virtue entitled him, flew into a passion and abruptly turned his back upon him.

The holy man showed no signs of indignation or displeasure, but when the evening was come, reflecting with sorrow on what had passed, he sent a friend to the house of Nicetas with this short message: "The sun is about to set."

The governor, touched with the allusion to the words of Scripture, "Let not the sun go down upon your anger," instantly rose and went to meet the Patriarch at the house of Nicetas, and earnestly imploring pardon, St. John tenderly embraced him, and assured him that he was already forgiven.

But the condition caused the greatest edification of all the citizens who knew not which to admire most, the humility of his holy Archbishop.

Medal For Fr. Quinn, Approved By Congress
WASHINGTON. Before the first session of the 76th Congress adjourned Saturday evening, it gave its final approval to a bill which confers "a gold medal of appropriate design" upon the Rev. Francis X. Quinn, assistant pastor of the Church of the Guardian Angel, New York City.
The bill introduced by Representative Michael J. Kennedy of New York cities, Father Quinn's conspicuous "gallantry and intrepidity" in entering an apartment where an armed desperado held an elderly couple as hostages, and after talking to the man for three-quarters of an hour, persuaded him to surrender his firearms.
