## Sisters Of Service Begin Work In U. S.

FARGO, N. D. Three Sisters of Service are arriving here this week to establish the first foundation of their community in the United States. This religious community of women was founded in Toronto by the late Archbishop McNeil.

The nuns coming to Fargo are Sister Morrison, who will act as the Superior, and Sisters Whelan and O'Keefe. After October 1 they will establish their own convent. Although bound by the same vows as any other religious community of women, the Sisters of Service do not change their names and do not wear the traditional religious garb but a uniform. The works in which they engage are manifold. At the port cities in Canada they meet the incoming immigrants and offer their services to all Catholic immigrants. In the larger cities they conduct homes, or hotels, for working girls. They also do settlement work in the poorest districts. In the field of social service they conduct small hospitals in the small towns and villages as well as do private nursing in the homes of the poor in the rural areas in western Canada. Sisters teach in the elementary schools. Perhaps the greatest field of activity in which the Sisters serve is that of religious instruction of adults in the religiously underprivileged areas in the West by means of vacation schools and correspondence courses.

In the Diocese of Fargo the Sisters will visit the sick and the homes of fallen-away Catholics, and engage in census-taking. Some will initiate a course of religious instruction by mail.
