NAZARETH TO OPEN NEW DORMITORY

An opening of the academic year at Nazareth College is now less than a month away. Preparations are being pushed forward for the increasing enrollment. The unusually large number of resident students this year has made necessary the working out of a plan for the opening of a beautiful dormitory to be known as Senior Hall.

Another feature which augurs well for the opening of the college in securing positions in the various professions and professions is the development of the Placement Bureau. It is now being directed by a former science teacher, now on the faculty, trained in vocational guidance and placement field work.

The liberal arts and science courses have been extended to include more courses in the Department of Philosophy. Another feature to be inaugurated this year is the offering of honor courses in two departments, where adequate direction can be provided. This will entail a deeper concentration and broader personal investigation and study of the chosen fields under faculty direction.

Honors students will have the privilege of optional attendance at classes. They will report at stated intervals to their course directors for conferences and seminars.

Examinations in the fields covered will be required of honors students at the end of the third and fourth years, the latter being the more completely comprehensive.

Honors students will take fewer courses than the regular students, and their work will be more specialized.

U.S. Group Honors Quebec Hospital

ST. LOUIS, (N.C.)—Carrying with them four bound volumes of illuminated greetings from Catholic hospitals in the United States, more than a dozen representatives of these hospitals, headed by the Rev. Alphonsus J. Schwallie, S.J., President of the Catholic Hospital Association, left here last evening for Quebec, to participate in the forty-first anniversary of the founding of the first hospital founded in America.

More than 500 Catholic hospitals prepared illuminated manuscripts of greeting for inclusion in the four memorial volumes. In addition, a brochure on the founding of the Canadian Catholic hospital, conducted by the Augustinian Hospital of the Mercy of Jesus, has been prepared under the authority of Father Schwallie and the Lady Hospitaliers of Quebec.

Faith Stories For Little Ones

There is a beautiful example, related in Holy Scripture, of the courage which we should practice in our faith, even at the cost of our lives, when the glory of God or the good of our neighbor requires it. I mean the history of the **MARTYRDOM OF ELEAZAR**.

During a cruel persecution with which Antiochus afflicted the Jews, in the hope of inducing them to abandon the worship of the true God, a venerable old man named Eleazar was brought before the judge and ordered to eat swine's flesh, as a proof that he had abandoned the observance of the law of Moses.

On his refusal, they strove to force it into his mouth, but as he manfully refused, preferring death to the violation of the law, he was ordered to be led to execution.

On his way, those who accompanied him, moved with pity for him and respect for his old age, took him aside, and begged him to eat at least a morsel of food which they brought him, and which was not forbidden by the law, that in appearance he might be considered to have obeyed the king's orders.

But he bravely made answer, "I do not become my age to dissimulate, whereby many young persons might think that Eleazar, at the age of fourscore and ten years, was gone over to the life of the Heathens; and so they, through dissimulation, should be deceived, and thereby should bring a curse and stain upon my old age."

"For though, for the present time, I should be delivered from the punishments of men, yet should I not escape the hand of the Almighty, neither alive or dead."

Having spoken thus, he was forthwith carried to execution. But when he was ready to die with stripes he groaned and said, "Oh Lord! Thou knowest that, whereas I might be delivered from death, I suffer grievous pains in body, but not in soul, well content to suffer these things, because I fear Thee. Thus did he die leaving to the whole nation an example of his faith and fortitude, 2 Mach. vi.

Fr. Coughlin Warns of U. S. 'Popular Front' Groups

DETROIT.—(N.C.)—A vigorous warning against the machinations of "Popular Front" organizations was sounded by the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin, Pastor of the Shrine of the Little Flower at Royal Oak, Mich., in his regular radio address Sunday.

Asserting that "Lenin, the high priest of Bolshevism, once maintained that his priests would succeed not through the direct agency of the Communist Party but rather through the agency of other organizations dominated by Communists," Father Coughlin quoted extensively from testimony given before the Dies Committee and from material read into the Congressional Record, to show Communist "booming from within" tactics in this country, especially in the field of youth organizations.

"The fact is, my friends," said Father Coughlin, "that you must become acquainted with the tactics which the wolves in sheep's clothing, consistently are destroying the foundations of our Americanism and Christianity."

Deciding that at no time in our history, "will we be free from the Arnolds and Iacariots," Father Coughlin added that "nevertheless, the modern pattern is plain. It is a pattern of destruction," he said, "a pattern by following which decay was produced in the nations of yesterday. The pattern which is being followed today is a pattern of destruction to lure the innocent people of our nation into the grave-yard of national death. My friends, I call on you to arouse yourselves and oppose the betrayers of your heritage."

"There are at least 60 well-established committees and organizations incorporated in the so-called Popular Front in the United States," Father Coughlin said. "These are subversive pink or red or brown anti-Christian and anti-American organizations."

"I am sure that you are all well acquainted with the tactics of the Communists. Spain should have served as a lesson to the world. Franco saved Spain from becoming a Soviet State, and he saved it just in time. Civil war was the only means for the overthrowing of the Third International had to be forced out."

"The Third International has no longer a footing in Western Europe. It must now turn towards the Americas. Mexico is already Sovietized and the United States is going through the process. Today America is at the crossroads. She must either take the road that leads to Communism or she must take the path that leads to Christianity."

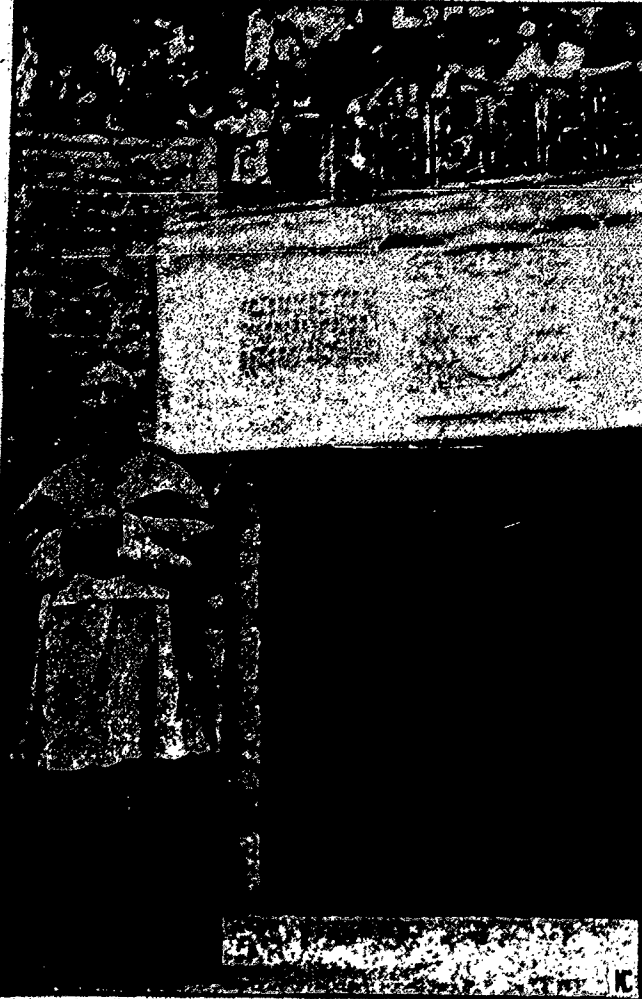

Sees U. S. In Red Hands

Predicting that there would be no war between France and Germany, Daniel O'Keefe, youngest son to hold political office in Canada, addressed the Social Justice Club of Rochester last Monday in Old St. Mary's Church on the "Canadian Attitude on World Affairs."

Mr. O'Keefe is a member of the National Executive Board of the National Unity Party of Canada and leader of the party in the province of New Brunswick.

"Because the Christian Front Movement in France will break at any moment, there will be no war between France and Germany," O'Keefe stated. "There will be peace because the movement will be aided by the Hitler government to the same extent as France in his battle to save Spain and Christianity was aided by Mussolini. Since the leading party in each country will be friendly towards each other, war will not come about."

"In regards to America," he said, "within the next twelve months there will be a financial crisis followed by a Communist revolution. What puzzles us Canadians is that the American people have not caught on to the real game of the Communists. Spain should have served as a lesson to the world. MISSIONARY UNION GIVEN MESSAGE FROM FOUNDER

WASHINGTON.—The hope that the first national convention of the Missionary Union of the Clergy in the United States, which convened at the Catholic University of America here, may open up for that organization "wider fields of activities for the more rapid advent of the Kingdom of God in this world" is expressed in a letter from the Rev. Paul Mannix in Rome, founder and now International Secretary of the Union.

The letter, addressed to the Most Rev. Francis J. Spellman, Archbishop of New York and President of the Missionary Union in the United States, was read to the meeting today.

"While sending my best wishes for the convention," states Father Mannix, "I pray the Holy Ghost to fill with His light and love the hearts of the eminent lecturers and of all those who take part in its labors. I feel sure that the lectures which will be read and discussed will stir up greater interest in the work of the Union and make the clergy of the United States more and more convinced of the necessity that all priests of the Church co-operate with her in the accomplishment of her universal mission of salvation."

Russia Silences Bishop Moscow.—Municipal authorities at Toula have forbidden the Orthodox Bishop, Anvrosij to speak publicly. He had denied statements made by the athletes that the Christian Churches in Germany and Italy are responsible for "racism" and are its best advocates.

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
