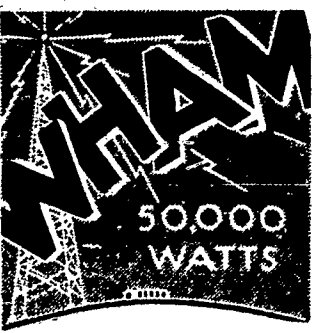

K. C. Program Set At Martyrs' Shrine

Members of the Knights of Columbus and of the Order of the Alhambra and their families and friends from various sections of this diocese are planning to make the second annual pilgrimage to the Shrine of the North American Martyrs at Auriesville on Sunday, September 10.

Day long ceremonies at the Shrine, this year, featuring leading Catholic personages of the State, will pay special honor to St. Isaac Jogues, the "ambassador of peace" who lost his life on the grounds where the shrine is now situated. Knights from all over the State will attend. Two special trains one from Buffalo and the other from New York will carry the knights to the Shrine.

Timone In Charge George A. Timone, chairman of the State Council Catholic Affairs Committee, in charge of arrangements, announces that representatives are expected from all of the 252 K of C Councils in the State. The special New York Central train will leave Buffalo at 2:30 A. M. Batavia, 6:20 A. M. Rochester, 7:06 A. M. and Newark, 7:46 A. M. On arrival at the shrine there will be a procession of the knights and Low Mass will be celebrated at 12:25 P. M. with His Excellency, the Most Rev. Edmund P. Gibbons, Bishop of Albany presiding and the Rev. James J. Rohan, S. J., director of the Shrine as celebrant. The sermon will be by the Most Rev. Francis A. McInerney, Chancellor of the Archdiocese of New York and State Chaplain of the K. of C.

At 2:15 P. M. there will be the Stations of the Cross, followed by blessing with the relic of the True Cross on the Hill of Prayer: 3:15 P. M. triple Benediction and Procession of the Most Blessed Sacrament to the Ravine, celebrant the Rev. Fr. E. Britt, Chancellor of the Diocese of Buffalo and Chaplain of Buffalo Council, Knights of Columbus, 3:30 P. M. short address of welcome by State Deputy Joseph E. Lamb, who was recently elected Supreme Secretary of the Knights of Columbus. Short sermon by the Rev. John J. O'Donnell, chaplain, New York Chapter, Knights of Columbus. The special train will leave on the return trip to Buffalo at 4:30 P. M.

Tickets in the Rochester area are being purchased in advance at the Rochester Consolidated Ticket Office, 24 Exchange Street. Ample facilities have been provided at the Shrine for luncheon at reasonable prices. The special train will carry a dining car for breakfast and dinner.

Cardinal Hinsley's talk begins the ninth year of the "Church of the Air" broadcasts. The interview will take place in London. Dr. Sheehy sails from Quebec today for England.

List Men's Retreat Sept. 3

ST. BONAVENTURE. A retreat for men will begin Friday evening, Sept. 1 at St. Bonaventure College under the direction of the Rev. Virgil Dwyer, O. F. M. of the Franciscan Mission Society. PRECIOUS VATICAN RELICS EXHIBITED IN HOLLAND

VATICAN CITY. Two precious gold crosses which have belonged for 100 years to the Treasury of the Basilica of St. Peter in Rome, have been placed by special permission of the Holy Father at the disposal of the Organizing Committee of the Willbrod Exhibition at Utrecht. The Dutch Minister in Rome, Dr. Hubrecht, and the representative of the Chapter of St. Peter have officially assigned the two crosses to the Mayor of Utrecht, Chairman of the Committee. The more important of the two crosses is a patriarchal one in massive gold, 40 centimeters high. According to the inscription, it was made in 926 to contain the relic of the Holy Cross. This is believed to be the largest reliquary in massive gold existing in the world. The smaller cross also contains a relic of the Cross and is richly adorned with jewels and pearls. This masterpiece was made at Byzantium in 1120.

"There is a Tide" by Ernest W. Veigel, Jr. Pres. Rochester Business Institute
