The Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester, will sound the campaign keynote for 300 workers at the dinner opening the second annual membership campaign of the Blackfriars Guild.

The dinner will be held next Thursday evening, September 7, at 6:30 P. M. at the Wegman Dining Hall, 375 Main Street East.

The bishop's address will be the highlight of the opening program which will be featured by the announcement of the 1938-1940 program of the Guild including the name of the Broadway star who will appear with the Blackfriars in the opening production at the Auditorium in October.

John E. Keenan, commissioner of the Board of Education, will preside as general chairman of the campaign with Mrs. Casimir Meisner as co-chairman. The announcements of the program will be made by the Rev. John S. Randall, moderator of the Guild.

A meeting at the Columbus Civic Center tonight will expose the division leaders and captains will be at tonight's meeting to formulate final plans.

Pact Discussed On Fr. Coughlin's Hour

DETROIT.—The effects of the alliance between Communist Russia and Nazi Germany on Christianity and the world were discussed by the Rev. Fr. Coughlin and the Rev. Dr. Edward Lodge Curran, President of the International Catholic Truth Society, in addresses broadcast Sunday.

Speaking on "The Challenge of the Pact and the Challenge of Social Justice," Fr. Curran declared that the principles of social justice flow from "the life-giving reality and the life-giving symbol of the cross."

"The movement of social justice to which we are dedicated is part and parcel of the Christian heritage of the past nineteen hundred years," he said. "The primary doctrine of social justice is the infinite value of infinite dignity of every human being born into this world. Man is not a machine. Labor is not a commodity. The spirit is superior to the flesh. This is the teaching of Christ. And this was the challenge thrown by the early Christians at the pagan totalitarianism of ancient Rome.

Back to the Church
"The entire history as well as the entire teaching of Christianity is associated with the movement of social justice. The first labor unions in the history of the world were the medieval guilds of the ages of Christian faith. What was the purpose of these medieval unions? Their purpose was economic as well as spiritual; sociological as well as social. They existed to secure higher wages, fewer working hours, better living and working conditions for the workers of the world.

Asserting that American Communists have been abandoned by Soviet Russia, Dr. Curran called upon them to "come back to the social and economic reform, nevertheless, because the Communists accept the ideology of Christian social justice."

Father Coughlin spoke on "What of the Future?" He, too, devoted most of his address to discussion of the Russian-German treaty.

Satanic Twins
"Communism and Nazism," he said, "while apparently poles apart, were, in reality, satanic twins of destruction. Although the leaders of these heinous systems proclaimed that their objectives aimed at social and economic reform, nevertheless, because they have made against God and right reason, they were destined from the outset to unite and produce nothing but ruin and devastation."

Asking what the Nazi-Soviet pact means, Father Coughlin continued:

"To America this means that henceforth we must treat Communism and Nazism alike. Every word spoken by the Communists or their fellow travelers against the followers of Nazism, they have spoken against themselves. Every word that they have made against Nazism—that it be boycotted from our shores; that it be accredited no representation by our State Department—they have uttered against Communism.

"To America this means that we no longer can be patient with Communism and their fellow travelers; that we no longer can be patient with Nazism or the Bundists.

"To America this means that if we wish to avoid the catastrophe which has fallen upon both Germany and Russia; if we wish to be satisfied people, we must face courageously the evils which characterize our own capitalistic system and eradicate them, cost what it may to the few."

CBS To Broadcast Pope's Discourse To Jociists

NEW YORK.—Pope Pius XII, speaking from the Vatican in Rome, will be heard over the Columbia Broadcasting System Wednesday, September 6, from 7:30 A. M. Eastern Daylight Saving Time.

The Pope at that time will address the Young Congress of the Young Catholic Workers.

In addition to carrying the address to listeners in the United States and Canada on the nationwide Columbia system, plans to short-wave the Pope's appeal to the rest of the world over its international stations, W2XK and WCAB.

NEW YORK.—The press medalion of the New York State Council of the Knights of Columbus has been awarded to William P. Carney, correspondent of the New York Times, for his reporting of the recent Spanish civil war.

The medal will be given to Mr. Carney at the second annual pilgrimage of the New York Knights of Columbus to the Shrine of the North American Blessed, Aqueduct, N. Y., on September 30.

George A. Timone, Chairman of the Council's Catholic Affairs Committee, said Mr. Carney's reporting of the Spanish civil war was selected as the outstanding reporting achievement of the year.

"His unbiased account on a subject that was often obscured when in less competent hands," Mr. Timone's statements added, "kept interested readers in the United States informed on a subject that had far reaching implications."

Original Music by Ten American Composers to be Featured on Good News of 1940

Classical Works To Be Written Especially for Program. Meredith Willson Announces

Ten of America's outstanding composers of popular music will be commissioned to write as many classical pieces for presentation in the Good News of 1940 program when it returns to the air over WHAM this fall.

Meredith Willson, musical director of the program, will present the original compositions each week as the Concert Hall feature of the broadcasts.

During the past two seasons Willson has been playing America's best loved compositions as selected in various polls. Two facts stood out in his mind first, the fact that the "small class" form and second, no American composer was represented in the list.

"The most universally beloved melodies of all time are classical Black, composer, conductor and the like, but minuets, serenades, caprices, barcarolles and other compositions in similar small, but none the less classic form" according to Willson.

"There is no doubt of the warm, inspirational talent of American writers of present-day popular music," Willson added. But he pointed out, they have neglected to write in the small form primarily because they have had no incentive.

Accordingly, such composers as Peter de Rose, Vernon Duke, Ferde Grofe, Dana Suesse and Morton Gould will be commissioned to compose for the Good News program.

The complete list of ten composers is being made up by a committee comprising Dr. Frank Black, composer, conductor and NBC's General Music Director, Meredith Willson and Howard Barlow, veteran radio conductor.

Soon after the Good News of 1940 program returns to the air over WHAM at 9:00 P. M. EDT, on Thursday, September 7, one of the composers will be commissioned each week. Subsequently Willson will present an original composition in the small form, a Serenade, an American Barcarolle, Caprice, Lullaby, Hymn, Marching Song and others in similar form.
