centers.

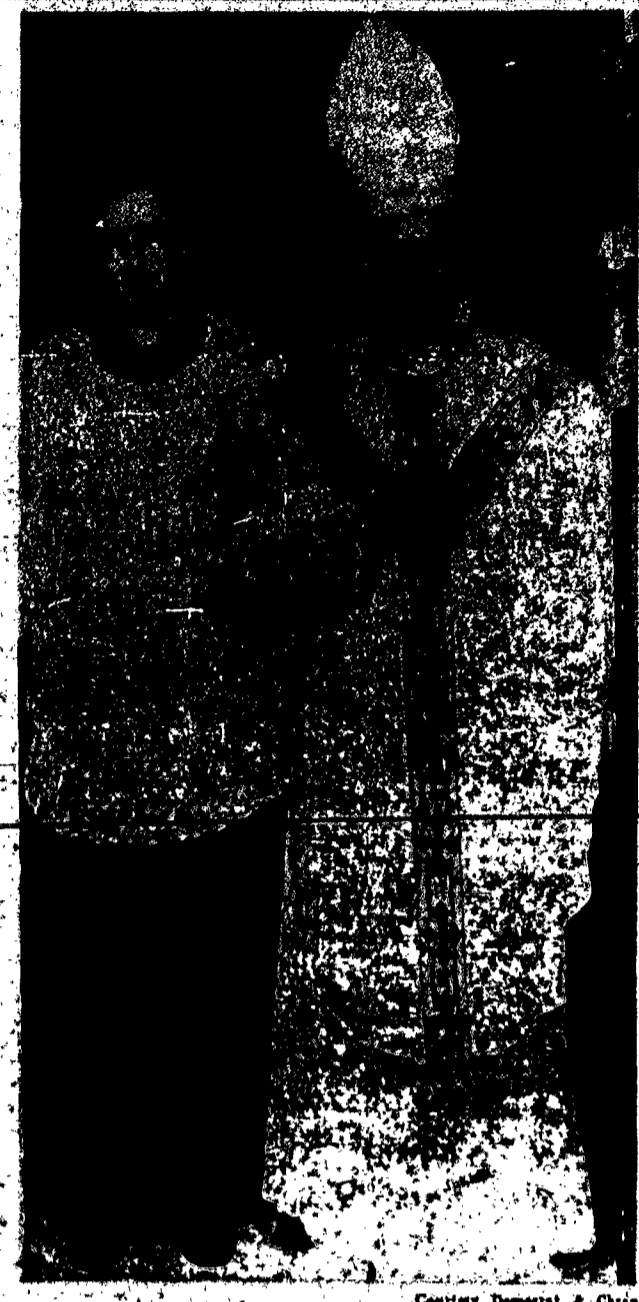
Other courses may be given for

vided by the Board of Education,
supported by the State Educational

In the Fall of 1918 the Bishop's
Committee issued a program of re-
ligious cooperation which opened
with these words: "The only way
to the end of the world war has
been through prayer. But the only
safeguard of peace is a social
justice and a social order. The
Bishop's Committee prepared a
program which they considered a
practical application of Catholic
moral principles to social and in-
dustrial life."

A Columnist Lauds Verein

PARIS. — Frederick Carl Frieseke,
noted American painter, died at
his home in Normandy at the age
of 86. On his death-bed he became
convert to the Catholic faith.
Mr. Frieseke's daughter is the
wife of Kostas Kilaris, son of
George Kilaris, renowned American
Catholic poet, who was a member
of the World War.
Many of Mr. Frieseke's paintings
were in notable American museums
and in the Louvre in Paris.
He was the brother of the Catho-
lic painter and the painter of the
World War.
