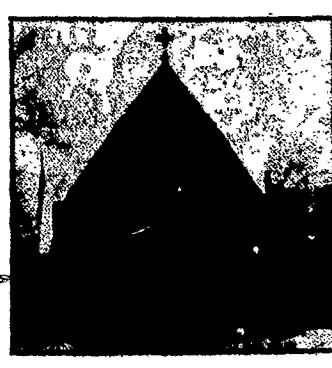

Corpus Christi Parish 600 REGISTER FOR SCHOOL

Some six hundred pupils are registered for the opening term at Corpus Christi School. Sister Hilary reports all things in good order, and the routine of study and recitation has begun in each grade. The Sisters ask for the cooperation of parents in things concerning school work, and look for that same interest that will make most effective the efforts of the Sisters to train the children in the studies prescribed.

Support of the school comes from the parish. The monthly School Collection is taken up on the 3rd Sunday of each month. The September School Collection is set for Sunday next, September 17, when it will be taken up at the Post-communion.

Ember Days fall this week, days of fasting. Workingmen and their families are allowed the use of meat on Wednesday and Saturday. Prayers for the spread of religion through blessings on the clergy are asked by the Church on the Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday of each week. Ember Days come four times a year, and have their name from the months of September and December—popularly these days of prayer and fasting came to be called "Ember" Days, from the closing syllables of the names of these months.

Corpus Christi Parish welcomes the first class of 26 girls who have entered on their high school career in the East Side Unit of Nazareth Academy at St. Agnes Institute. This class may well form the nucleus of a complete high school for girls, with a full four year course. The large classes in the other high schools for girls are an indication of the need of this new unit, and the new branch of Nazareth Academy has every prospect of rapid growth in keeping with the growth of Catholic Rochester. Sister M. Lambert is Principal of the East Side Nazareth, and expresses herself as pleased with the registration for the opening term.

The Seminary Letter of Bishop Kearney will be read at the Masses Sunday, and Seminary Envelopes will be placed in the hands of all parishioners. The Seminary Collection will be taken up on Sunday, September 24. Seminary Sunday. The large registration at St. Bernard's and St. Andrew's Seminaries is an indication of the splendid work these institutions are doing in the training of young men for the Priesthood. Rochester is fortunate in having the great and noted St. Bernard's Seminary still carrying on after forty years of the education of young lives inaugurated in 1893 by the late Bishop McQuaid. Plans looking to the removal of activities by the parish societies are in the making and announcements will soon be made of a program for the Holy Name Society, the Rosary Society, the Young Ladies Sodality, and the League of the Sacred Heart.

"General Franco was typical of this state of mind and although he answered my questions about the war readily enough, his interest and enthusiasm were manifestly for the work of rebuilding the New Spain. The youth of the country share this enthusiasm for what might be described as a New Deal carried out by the people instead of the government."

Regarding so-called Italian-German domination of Spain, Mr. Gibson said the facts that their troops have left Spain, the Basque Islands have been evacuated by the Italians and the Germans have given up the airfields they built in Northern Spain.

"These are not arguments," he declared, "they are facts. The other fears may be discounted, such as the setting up of a Fascist State as a general nuisance."

Mr. Gibson also described the work of the Auxilio Social, the National Social Aid organization which performs the corporal works of mercy for those in need. This work is on a volunteer basis, he added, and is performed largely by women and girls of the more prosperous classes.

Slum clearance is progressing favorably, he said, being financed by private contributions. People are being housed in "chambrás" groups of small houses and at a rent cost "easily within the reach of all."

One of the things he heard on all sides was the statement that the ill of Spain could be by no means attributed to the Reds," he declared. "The other classes had their full share of responsibilities," he stated, "because if the poor and ignorant had not been grievously neglected, the Reds would never have found such a rich field."

He said he was interested to find that according to the figures of the Barcelona Government, all the larger landed estates in Spain put together would not equal the properties of one single English Duke and less than a good many American land owners."

The reputed "vast" landholdings of the Catholic Church in Spain proved, he added, to be even more of a myth.

"We have been given lurid accounts of how the peasants were oppressed on these huge estates to produce revenues for luxurious clergy," he said. "Those who are dealing with fairy stories I should like to touch upon one which I confess to have believed myself. After reading several accounts daily of air raids over Barcelona and Valencia, I had formed a picture of those two towns almost in ruins from the daily attacks. To my surprise, I found no more evidence of air raids than I would find in Washington or San Francisco."

"We stopped repeatedly in both towns to ask where we could find the damage done by air bombardment. In each instance, we got the prompt reply, 'Go to the port.'"

"The port in each town is situated some distance from the town and constituted a military objective. The wharves in the immediate neighborhood were a shambles, but that was not by any means the picture given us over a period of two years and a half. I mention it as another striking instance of the effect of telling the
