Luxembourg's Religion Described By Prince

The visit to the United States of Prince Felix de Bourbon-Parme, Prince Consort of the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg, and his eldest son, Prince Jean, the heir apparent, has served to focus attention upon the fact that the reigning family and virtually all of the people of the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg are Catholics.

During their stay in this country, the Princes were the guests of President Roosevelt at the White House and took leading parts in the observance of "Luxembourg Day" at the New York World's Fair.

Luxembourg this year is celebrating the twelfth century of the Anglo-Norman monk Willibrod, who landed in the country as a missionary in 842. Prince Felix, who was Bishop of Utrecht and who founded at Echternach the Benedictine monastery and the church where his tomb is still to be seen. On every Wednesday of 1880 it was the custom to have a religious procession taking place in Echternach. It ends at the Basilica where the pilgrims kneel before the marble sarcophagus of St. Willibrod. It is reminiscent of the time when the saint's intervention was for the people release from a plague (the St. Vitus dance).

Varied History

This year, too, the tiny nation celebrates the centenary of its independence. Luxembourg has had a long and varied history, but the actual Grand Duchy of today dates only to the Treaty of Vienna which concluded the Napoleonic Wars in 1815. Until the Belgian revolution of 1830 it was a part of the Kingdom of the Netherlands, which was then ruled by the King of Holland, who at the same time was Grand Duke of Luxembourg. Finally, in 1839, the Luxembourgians were allowed to be masters of their own destiny.

The Grand Duchy of Luxembourg is an independent and sovereign State with a constitutional monarchy. The present ruler is the Grand Duchess Charlotte, the daughter of the Grand Duke William IV of the Grand Duchy of Nassau family, and the Princess Mary-Ann of Braganza. On November 6, 1918, the Grand Duchess was married to Prince Felix de Bourbon-Parme, son of Robert de Bourbon, last reigning Duke of Parma, who was descended from Louis XIV by his grandson, Philippe de Bourbon, Duke of Anjou and King of Spain. It is this Prince Felix who has just returned to the United States with his elder son, Prince Jean, born January 5, 1921. There are six children in the royal family—two boys and four girls.

Country's Motto

The motto of Luxembourg is, "We wish to remain what we are." Over this motto which appears in the Luxembourg pavilion at the World's Fair are the following lines: "Loyal little Luxembourg, celebrating a century of independence looks back on a millennial history of splendid humility, saints and heroes, and forward to a perpetual lease of freedom under God in peace and justice."

In the old Chateau at Clerf, Luxembourg, is a portrait of the late Franklin D. Roosevelt stating that he is descended, on his mother's side, from the Lannoi family, which in the past had been owners of the castle.

War Halts Lourdes Pilgrims

LOURDES, FRANCE—Lourdes, usually filled to capacity at this season of the year, is a deserted village. Between 12,000 and 13,000 pilgrims were expected this week but all pilgrimages, including the great National Pilgrimage which was to have arrived last week, were canceled because of the uncertainty of train service.

Practically all hotels are closed and although the streets are open on the Boulevard de la Grotte, there are no customers and the proprietors—women—are seated in front knitting, or standing in groups discussing the war.

A few people, mostly women, some old men and priests, pray earnestly before the Grotto.

Less events are the phrase that has succeeded the Cretes in Lourdes. The Cretes, who are Americans some 20 years ago. Everything is delayed or even stopped entirely because of the war.

We arrived in Lourdes Thursday evening. Our message asking for reservations, sent three days before, had not been received but there was no difficulty getting accommodations.

There was only one other guest in the hotel. But on Friday morning, we were informed that the hotel had been requisitioned by military orders for a hospital and that we must leave immediately.

With much persuasion we were allowed to remain until Saturday morning. But the business of converting a hotel into a hospital commenced at once. Through the kindness of the Sisters of Charity of Christian Instruction, we obtained two rooms at the Clinique Bernadette, a private infirmary run by the Sisters in connection with their large charity hospital.

This morning at Mass in the parish church, Monsignor read a Pastoral Letter from the Most Rev. Georges Choquet, Bishop of Tarbes-et-Lourdes, asking the people to pray and to hold services as best they could now that so many priests have gone from Lourdes. The pastor, mentioning that all places of amusement are closed, urged the people to use the money usually spent for such purposes for charitable works and to devote the time to prayer.

Alabama Is Made St. Gregory Knight

MOBILE, Ala.—For the first time a layman of the Diocese of Mobile has been elevated to the rank of Knighthood in the Order of St. Gregory the Great. He is John Carroll, of Birmingham.

Two priests also have been raised to the rank of Domestic Prelate with the title of Right Reverend Monsignor. They are Raymond M. Cullen, Director of Catholic Charities here.

The laymen honored are: Mrs. Augustine Meagher, Mrs. Joseph Hynds, Mrs. L. C. Moore, Mrs. Edith Harrison, all of Mobile.

Pope Increases Austerity of Life

assurance of their good will and of their resolve to maintain peace.

This was revealed on June 7 when the Sovereign Pontiff told the Sacred College of Cardinals that the Church "does not think of letting herself be deceived and convinced by particular interests nor of mixing herself in the territorial competitions between States, nor of being dragged into the intricate conflict that may result from them, but nevertheless she cannot, in the interests of the gravest danger for peace and of most numerous points of dispute, refrain from offering her maternal word or, on being requested, refuse to offer her personal services to stop the threatened use of force with its incalculable material and moral consequences."

Radio Appeal Renewed

Resorting to the radio for a memorable broadcast to the world, Pope Pius XII on August 24 made an historic "radio address" to the people of the world for the preservation of peace. "Once again," the Sovereign Pontiff declared, "a critical hour strikes for the great human family—a hour of tremendous deliberations, toward which our heart cannot be indifferent and from which our spiritual authority, coming to us from God to lead souls in the way of justice and peace, must not hold itself aloof."

It was on this occasion that Pope Pius said: "Nothing is lost with peace; all may be lost with war."

Grief Over War's Outbreak

Just as he had exerted every effort up to the last minute to avert the conflict, the Pope was deeply grieved when war broke out. The Vatican's labors for peace, ceaseless but unobtrusive, were intensified in the last week before the war. Every day members of the diplomatic corps accredited to the Holy See called at the Vatican. Cardinal Maglione returned from a visit to his native town, and plunged into the work at hand with renewed vigor. But, even while he was away, he had kept his constant touch with the Vatican by telephone and courier.

In an audience accorded His Excellency the Most Rev. Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, before his return to his post at Washington, Pope Pius revealed his profound grief that his many efforts to preserve peace in Europe had been unavailing.

On September 14, Pope Pius XII

Carmelite Nuns Suffering Sorely

Archbishop Mazzoli, the Apostolic Delegate in Bulgaria, sent us this letter:

"I make it a point to write to you only in extreme cases. Just now I am very much concerned about the Carmelite Nuns in Sofia."

"These poor women are deserving of help. There are ten of them living in a poor section of Sofia in a house so old that it should be condemned. It was never built with the idea of being a convent. For these miserable quarters, the Sisters pay thirty dollars a month rent."

"Every foot of space in the house is occupied. All that any Nun has is a plain cot screened around with white cloth. No Sister, not even the superioress, has a room of her own. If one Nun becomes ill, the entire household is disturbed."

"The house is only one difficulty. These women living under a strict rule deprive themselves of everything except the bare necessities. There are times when even the bare necessities are lacking. I asked the Reverend Mother what she would consider the smallest possible sum on which her community could live. She said that she needs Five Dollars a month for each Nun."

"I know you can't build a convent for these women. Can you at least keep them alive? Remember in all Bulgaria there are only five thousand Byzantine Catholics. The younger women who live near the convent like to visit the Sisters' Chapel and often post out their sorrows to the Nuns. Please keep this convent open."

"Can some of our readers pay a month's rent for these Sisters—thirty dollars? We hope they will. We ask all who can to send us Five Dollars and support one Sister for a month."
