

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

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

Joe Penner, super duck salesman, whose overnight rise to fame resulted from an appearance on Rudy Vallee's NBC program in 1937, will return to the air with a new series of quack broadcasts on Thursday, Oct. 5. Titled "Tip Top Show," the programs will be heard from 8:30 to 9:00 P. M., EST, over WHAM. Ward Baking Company is the sponsor.

Penner will be supported by an all-star cast including Edna Ryan as his man Godfrey, Guy Seabrook as his girl Susabella, Russ Brown, straight man, and Kenny Stevens, young tenor currently featured at Earl Carroll's Hollywood Theater Restaurant.

Born in Hungary as Joseph Pinter, Penner came to this country at the age of nine and lived with his parents in Detroit. After varied career as a newsboy, choir singer, factory worker, and piano salesman, Joe broke into vaudeville as a mind reader's assistant. That job, he conceded, he got by luck.

It was while touring the vaudeville circuits that he developed his famous phrase, "Wanna buy a duck?"

In July, 1933, Joe made his first radio appearance as a featured artist on the Rudy Vallee program and scored an immediate hit. In October of the same year, he became the star of his own NBC program, and by June, 1934, was voted by fans as America's outstanding radio artist. In recent years Penner has assigned his radio activities with motion picture work.
