Pope Commends Mary To Mexican Pilgrims

VATICAN CITY. — (NC) — Re- course to the Blessed Virgin in these times of trial and suffering was strongly urged at two impressive ceremonies that have just taken place here.

Both ceremonies were connected with the presentation by a group of Mexican pilgrims of a statue of Our Lady of Guadalupe which has been erected in the Vatican Gardens. The occasion gave the Sovereign Pontiff another opportunity to manifest his deep paternal affection for Mexico.

Participating in the dedication of the statue, Pope Pius received the Mexican pilgrims in a private audience on Wednesday.

"You come from a dear land, where the faithful of Jesus have been united in tribulations and sufferings, and have been sustained in persecution for the death by the Name of Jesus." His Holiness told the Mexican Bishops, priests and laymen. "Tell all Our Children that the Lord is rewarding abundantly their constancy in the Faith and their sufferings borne for Jesus. They are divine seeds giving fruit a hundred-fold."

"Thank you for the statue of Our Lady of Guadalupe erected in Our garden. We have unlimited trust in the maternal love and powerful protection of the Blessed Virgin Mary, always uniting Us with you. We must invoke Mary, to that in every danger and every oppression she may come to our help, may inspire and encourage the weak, may intercede for all people, obtaining from her Divine Son priests and holy men who fear God and pious mothers and youth who are sound and constant in their faith."

As a promise of these graces, the Holy Father imparted his Apostolic Blessing to all those present, the faithful of Mexico, and their country.

Cardinal Canali accepted the statue on behalf of the Pope at the actual ceremonies of dedication. He thanked the pilgrims of Mexico for their generous gift.

"This tiny land, the City of St. Peter, with its brief sky is indeed an asylum of refuge and peace," Cardinal Canali said. "But other vast lands today hear the rumbling of cannon and other days flash today with the fires of war to mark a tempest of destruction and carnage. More than ever it is our duty, and that of all peoples, to raise our glance and our thoughts to God and to implore through the Blessed Virgin that divine justice be placated as soon as possible and that infinite divine mercy give back to the world the supreme treasure of peace."

Add 'Style Show' To Auto Show

TECHNY, Ill. — The Mission of the Most Rev. Herman Schoppelrey, S.V.D., Vicar Apostolic of Sinyangchow in Honan Province, China, has been destroyed, according to word received by the Divine Word Fathers at St. Mary's Mission House, here.

The entire town of Sinyangchow has been wiped out, and Bishop Schoppelrey is staying with the Prefect Apostolic of nearby Chumatin, it is reported.

CHICAGO—(NC)—Raymond J. Kelly, of Detroit, was named National Commander of the American Legion, at its annual convention here this week. The Rev. Patrick N. McDermott, pastor of the Church of St. Peter and Paul, Atlantic, Ia., was chosen National Chaplain.

It is interesting to note that both Mr. Kelly and Lewis J. Murphy, of South Bend, Ind., who was elected National Commander of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War at their annual convention in Boston, are Catholics and are graduates of the University of Notre Dame. Both are attorneys.

Mr. Kelly while at Notre Dame University was a classmate of Grand Knight Joseph P. Ryan, Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus; Federal Judge Harold P. Burke, Attorney Arthur E. Curran, Edwin A. Bois and Thomas O'Connor, News Editor of the CATHOLIC COURIER, who expressed pleasure over his election. He is also known to the Rev. Dr. George F. Kettell, pastor of St. Mary's Church who spoke highly of the new commander's ability. Dr. Kettell is a former national chaplain of the Legion.

DETROIT—Raymond J. Kelly, who has just been chosen National Commander of the American Legion, is Corporation Counsel of the City of Detroit, a post he has held since 1933. Mayor Reading has offered to give him a year's leave of absence from his duties, during his full time to his Legion duties. A member of Gesù parish, Mr. Kelly serves regularly as an usher at that church. He is the father of six children, one of whom, Raymond J. Kelly, Jr., is a student at the University of Notre Dame.

Mr. Kelly was born on a farm near Otsego, Mich. He entered the University of Notre Dame in 1917. He completed a law course at the University of Detroit and went to Fort Sheridan in 1917, injured in a bayonet exercise. He was then discharged. He then enlisted as a private in the Field Artillery and served as a sergeant in the headquarters battery of the 323d Field Artillery, 85th Division. He went overseas in 1918. In France, he was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in Battery F, 52d Coast Artillery and was discharged from the service in 1919. He holds a commission as Major in the Army Reserve Corps.

Orders Bus To Pick Up Penn Yan Pupils

An order directing bus transportation service for pupils living in the district of St. Michael's School, Penn Yan, N. Y., has been issued by Frank P. Graver, State Commissioner of Education.

The order sustained an appeal from action of the special school meeting held in District No. 9, town of Benton, in the county of Yates.

Refusal had been made to transporting two children of William P. Prendergast from their home in Gags, N. Y., to St. Michael's School in Penn Yan, a distance of three-quarters of a mile.

The bus which furnishes transportation to the high school students from District No. 9 to Penn Yan Academy goes by the Prendergast home. Mr. Prendergast has been paying for his two children to ride on the bus but following the adoption of legislation providing free bus transportation for children of public, private and parochial schools, he made application to the school board of his district to have the children ride on the school bus without charge in conformity with the law.

Being refused he appealed to the State Commissioner of Education through his attorney, Edward P. Murphy.

The Commissioner's decision orders the trustee to provide the transportation and to "pay the reasonable cost thereof out of any funds of the district available for such purpose, subject to the approval of the district superintendent of schools and of this Department."

If there are no funds available for such a purpose, the trustee is authorized and directed "to raise by tax on the taxable property of the district a sum sufficient to pay for same."

Urges K. C. Fulfill Duties As Citizens

PHILADELPHIA—(NC)—Indifference to the duties of citizenship assists the growth of totalitarianism, the Most Rev. Bartholomew J. Eustace, Bishop of Camden, said here Sunday in an address at the Communion breakfast of San Salvadore Council of the Knights of Columbus.

Asserting that Fascist states are the outgrowth of two things—fear of Communism and a conviction of the inefficiency and ineptitude of democratic systems—Bishop Eustace said that, since the fear of Communism already exists to some extent in this country, "there is necessity to remove from democratic institutions the fear of Communism."

"We shall enjoy the benefits of democracy," the Bishop said, "as long as we deserve them, and we shall deserve them as long as we are conscious of our duties as citizens."

"We must be vigorous in doing all in our power to stay the progress of Communism, without which Fascism cannot rear its ugly head, and we must remove the ineptitudes of government. Every man who is dissatisfied in the candidate for public office advances the approach of the absolute state. "The state exists for the family and for the individual, not the family and the individual for the state."
