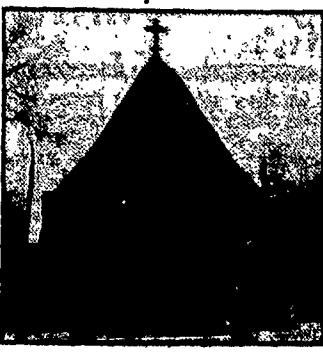

PRIESTS TRANSFERRED**

The parish regrets the departure of Father Ratigan, who has been called by Bishop Kearney to undertake the work of Assistant Director of the Rochester Catholic Charities. He has been here only a short time, but has won a place in the affections of the priests and people of the parish by his faithful attention to duty and his sympathetic approach to those in affliction, by his skillful presentation of Catholic Doctrine in pulpits and in the classroom and by his friendly presence. The gratitude of the people and their good wishes for his future success and happiness go with him as he enters on the responsibilities of his new charge.

The Rev. John Dwyer, J. U. D., has been appointed to succeed Father Ratigan as Assistant Pastor of Corpus Christi Church. Father Dwyer comes to us well prepared by study in Rome and by previous parish service for his duties as Assistant Pastor. He gave an interesting talk to the Holy Name Society last Wednesday evening on his experiences in France and England at the outbreak of war, and on his passage back to America on the S.S. Mauretania. Father Dwyer will find a cordial welcome from priests and people at Corpus Christi. May his career here be a happy and a successful one!

Cardinal Mundelein

pleas surprise, awaited Cardinal Mundelein. Pope Pius XI left the Vatican for only the third time since ascending the Chair of Peter and the territory of Vatican City for only the second time since the settlement of the so-called Roman Question, to assist at these dedicatory services. His Holiness paid special honor to Cardinal Mundelein on this occasion, telling the Cardinal that he could well be content with such a beautiful and consoling day.

Cardinal Mundelein, who himself was a guest at the White House on numerous occasions, had the rare privilege of entertaining the President of the United States at luncheon in his own house on October 5, 1937.

President Roosevelt was in Chicago for the dedication of a bridge joining the north and south sides of the city, and drove to the Cardinal's residence immediately following that ceremony. The Cardinal's residence remained at the Cardinal's residence for nearly two hours.

Earlier that same year—in May, 1937—in view of his most vigorous statements, Cardinal Mundelein assailed the anti-Catholic propaganda of the German Government. His Eminence was speaking at the quarterly conference of his clergy, and he said "the least we can do to help the German Church is to show our own sympathy in this hour of trial."

He styled the war propaganda as "bed-time stories for children" in comparison to the Nazi propaganda against the Church and charged that the trials of Religious there were motivated by a desire to shatter "public faith in Catholic education."

The Cardinal's remarks were echoed throughout the world and his Eminence was warmly praised for his courage in making such a vigorous presentation of the Church's position.

Cardinal Mundelein was active in urging wide Catholic Action to combat growing evils of the day. Speaking at the annual meeting of the Holy Name Society in Chicago on January 1938, His Eminence called upon Holy Name men to enroll in a campaign of Catholic Action to combat atheistic movements and to work for the reforms of the Church by calling it the great conservative force, and then called upon it to act as a police force
