WOMEN TO VIEW MOVIE

The recent, rapid development
and expansion in public health
work due to the stimulus of fed-
eral funds granted to the States
under the National Act for the
Public Health Nursing, passed by
the Congress in 1938, has cre-
ated a growing demand for
well-trained public health nursing.
The term, public health nursing,
as commonly used today, distin-
guishes this field from that of hos-
pital and private duty nursing. It
is a specialized branch of nursing
requiring preparation beyond the
basic professional course. Its chief
goal is to bring service to the fam-
ily and community.

The Public Health Nursing Pro-
gram at The Catholic University of
America meets the standards of
the National Association for Pub-
lic Health Nursing, and is one of
the twenty-one institutions of
higher learning in the United
States so approved.

The Catholic university and the
United States Public Health Ser-
vice, as the capital is the hub of
activity in this field, today, distin-
guishes this field from that of hos-
pital and private duty nursing. It
is a specialized branch of nursing
requiring preparation beyond the
basic professional course. Its chief
goal is to bring service to the fam-
ily and community.

Another important privilege of
the students at the Catholic Uni-
versity is the use of over a half a
dozen libraries, the like of which
can be found in no other city in
the country; for example, the Li-
brary of Congress, the Army Medi-
cal Library, the United States
Public Health Service Library, the
National Institute of Health Li-
brary, the Children's Bureau Li-
brary, the Department of Educa-
tion, the Bureau of Education
Library, and others.

At the Catholic University itself,
public health nursing students en-
joy contact with the faculties of
the other schools of the University,
particularly those of the School of
Social Work, the Graduate School
of Arts and Sciences, and the
School of Social Sciences.

The program of public health
nursing requires for completion

approximately one year on a full-
time basis. It includes courses of
a theoretical and practical nature,
and may be credited toward the
degree of Bachelor of Science in
Public Health Nursing. It covers
courses in public health, public
health nursing, ethics, psychology,
sociology, social case work, and the
related fields. A part of the year's
program is offered each summer
so that it is possible to complete it
in three summer sessions and one
semester of the academic year.

Other arrangements of time are
also possible. A real effort is made
by the faculty of the School of
Nursing to meet the needs of each
student.

Public health nursing students
must meet all the requirements for
admission to the School of Nurs-
ing Education, of which the Pub-
lic Health Nursing Division is a
part. These requirements are:
1. Graduation from a second-
ary school approved by a region-
al or stated accrediting agency,
or admission to the School of Nurs-
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lic Health Nursing Division is a
part. These requirements are:
2. Graduation from an accred-
ited school of nursing offering a
satisfactory curriculum.
3. Recommendation from the
director of public health nursing
by whom the nurse has been em-
ployed, attesting to her ability for
this field, and certification of
good moral character from a
priest or any other responsible
person.

Registration for the practice
of public health nursing in the
States in which the student has
practiced.
5. An introductory experience
of at least two months in an ap-
proved field of public health
nursing is strongly urged.
6. Report of a physical exam-
ination given within the year.
7. A personal interview where
registration is required unless
distance forbids.
