Bar Red Meetings In Public Schools

PITTSBURGH.—The use of public school buildings for the holding of meetings has been denied the Communist Party by the Board of Public Education. Superintendent of Schools Dr. Men G. Graham asked the board for an opinion after the Communist Party had applied to him for a permit to meet in Schenck High School. The board advised against granting the permit. It was announced, out of a desire to safeguard democratic principles which the members of the board felt were involved if the schools were left open to Communist propaganda.

War Forces Missioners To Return To Europe

AMSTERDAM.—Forty missioners, members of the Society of the Divine Word, were on route to the Orient aboard a German steamer. The ship was in the Mediterranean when radio orders were received for all German ships to return at once. During the night the course was changed. The passengers were returned to the German port of Bremerhaven. Twenty Brothers were ordered to join the German army. The twenty others, priests, were allowed to return to the rectoryhouse of the Society at Steyl, Holland.

Novel By Geo. Shuster Picked By Book Club

NEW YORK.—"Look Away," a novel by George N. Shuster, has been designated the October choice of the Catholic Book Club. It is published by the Macmillan Company, this city. Shuster, Cunningham, reviewing the book in the Book Club's Newsletter, calls it "a story which might easily and in frustration, were it not for an influence, spiritual in essence, showing that an apprehension of right values is an invaluable asset in solving the problem of living."

Pope Nuncio Confers On Humanizing Warfare

PARIS.—His Excellency the Most Rev. Valerio Zanone, Papal Nuncio in France, has conferred with Premier Daladier and Under-Secretary for Foreign Affairs Charles Bessis. He discussed the subject of humanizing warfare. The French Government, it was stated, is anxious to arrive at an accord that would prevent "unnecessary" losses of civilian lives from the devastation of war.

Priest Talks On Neutrality

"Neutrality" was the subject of a talk given last Sunday afternoon in St. Joseph's Hall before the Catholic Central Verein of America, Rochester Branch, by Rev. John Bohmwech, Assistant at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church.

Father Bohmwech reviewed the history of neutrality in the United States. He indicated the true nature of neutrality, and the circumstances under which a person or a nation may be neutral. He distinguished between theoretical neutrality and practical neutrality. He stated that there may be cases where a person or a nation could be neutral in practice, but under the same circumstances not neutral in theory.

CLEVELAND.—Resignation of the Rev. Michael L. Moriarty as Diocesan Director of Charities and appointment of the Rev. Albert J. Murphy as his successor is announced. A resolution was passed protesting against the recent action of the National Association of Broadcasters in regard to the code adopted at their convention held in Atlantic City last July on the ground that it is an attempt on their part to be dictators in regard to the matter of free speech. The resolution was directed to be sent to the Federal Communications Commission.

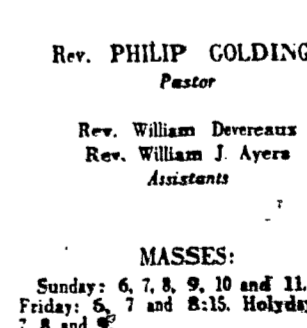
