**Monsignor Lavelle Buried Amid Honors**

NEW YORK. (NO) — While Church and city mourned his passing, New York's beloved Monsignor Lavelle was buried here Oct. 21 at St. Patrick's Cathedral after impressive funeral rites attended by more than 7,000 persons of all classes and all creeds.

Monsignor Lavelle, who had been associated with St. Patrick's cathedral throughout his 40 years in the priesthood, 32 of them as its Rector, was entombed next to the crypt under the high altar at St. Patrick's bearing the remains of his great friend, the late Patrick Cardinal Hayes. This crypt is reserved for the most illustrious priestly dead of the Archdiocese of New York, only Cardinals McCloskey, Hayes, and O'Connell, Bishops Hughes and Corrigan being buried there before Monsignor Lavelle.

The Pontifical Requiem Mass was sung for the 83-year-old priest who died Tuesday, by the Most Rev. Francis J. Spellman, Archbishop of New York. Monsignor Lavelle was praised as a venerable priest of God who for over 40 years gave tireless and devoted service for the good of the Church, the salvation of souls and the welfare of his country. The Most Rev. Stephen J. Donahue, Auxiliary Bishop of New York, in the eulogy, Many Bishops Present.

After the Mass, Archbishop Spellman gave the final absolutions. Then Monsignor Lavelle's bronze casket was placed in the crypt beneath the high altar. The funeral service also being read by Archbishop Spellman.

Present at the services were 12 members of the Hierarchy, nearly 50 Monsignors, more than 600 priests, and hundreds of distinguished laymen, both Catholic and non-Catholic. The officers of the Mass and the visiting prelates were escorted into the Cathedral by a procession of several hundred priests and seminarians, which formed at the nearby Cathedral College. Archbishop Spellman and Bishop Donahue, other prelates present for the funeral included the Most Rev. John J. Mitty, Archbishop of San Francisco, and Bishops Thomas R. Molloy, of Brooklyn, N. Y.; James E. Walsh, Superior General of Maryknoll; Thomas H. McLaughlin, of Patterson; James E. Kearney, of Rochester; Bartholomew J. Eustace, of Camden; James E. Cassidy, of Fall River; Bernard Keown, of the Vicar Apostolic of the Bahamas; Raymond A. Kearney, Auxiliary of Brooklyn; and William A. Griffin, Auxiliary of Fall River.

Distinguished laymen present included Postmaster General James A. Farley, Governor Herbert H. Lehman, of New York, United States Senator Robert F. Wagner, Lieutenant Governor Charles F. Celli, of New York; Mayor Fiorello H. LaGuardia, of New York; Newbold Morris, president of the City Council, former Gov. Alfred Smith, of New York; William S. Burke, George MacDonal, Dr. Raymond Sullivan, John C. Kelly and Judge Alfred J. Talley.

**Monsignor Donahue Of N.Y. Archdiocese Named Vicar General**

NEW YORK.—The Rt. Rev. Magr. Joseph P. Donahue, Church of the Ascension rector, was appointed Vicar General of the Archdiocese of New York to succeed the late Rt. Rev. Magr. Michael J. Lavelle, by the Most Rev. Francis J. Spellman, Archbishop of New York, on Tuesday.

The Rt. Rev. Magr. J. Francis A. McIntyre, Chancellor was appointed to succeed Monsignor Donahue as a member of the Diocesan Board of Consultors of which he had been secretary. Monsignor Donahue, a member of this board since 1936, automatically relinquished the membership on promotion to be vicar general.

Monsignor Donahue, who served in the State Chaplain of the Knights of Columbus.

**Social Workers Elect Fr. Lambert To Post**

A New York priest was elected president, a Rochester priest, a vice president, and the Catholic Social Workers' dinner was one of the highlights of the New York State Conference on Social Work held in Rochester last week.

The conference is composed of more than 5000 members of public and private agencies in all fields of public welfare. Participating were priests, nurses and Catholic lay workers from all over the state.

Named to head the society was the Rev. Bryan J. McEnigart, Director of the Division of Children of New York Catholic Charities, a distinguished social worker and authority on social problems. His division co-ordinates the work of more than 70 Catholic agencies in the Archdiocese of New York, its staff of 2,700 religious and lay workers last year served 37,800 boys and girls.

The Rev. Gerald C. Lambert, diocesan director of Catholic Charities, who was named a vice president, was a member of the Rochester Committee on the convention last year he served on the city manager's special committee on housing.

Bishop Guest Speaker

There were 341 Catholic social workers who heard His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester, speak at the dinner sponsored by the Rochester Catholic social workers at the Rochester Club, Thursday evening.

The Bishop stressing the obligations of Catholics in social work declared that everyone in that work whether an executive, case-worker or telephone operator was contributing to the Christ-like dispensing of charity. The heart more than the head should be used, the Bishop said in bringing Christian charity to the unfortunate.

The spiritual motto was likewise stressed by David C. Adie, State Welfare Commissioner, who emphasized the importance that understanding and consideration play in dealing with the needy.

Speakers were presented by Emmet R. Gahn, Commissioner, City Department of Public Welfare, in his inimitable manner.

The dinner was arranged by a committee headed by Father Lambert as chairman. Assisting were Miss Mary E. Nolan, Monroe County Child Placing Department; Mrs. Pauline J. Brennan, Executive Director and Miss Elizabeth McSweeney, Family and Child Placing Division Rochester Catholic Charities.
