

Crusaders Organize Cleary Veteran Unit

The Cleary Veteran Unit, of the Catholic Students Mission Crusade, on Sunday, October 29, entertained at a tea given in honor of their newly recruited members. Over one hundred enthusiastic crusaders attended the affair held at the Blackfriars' Guild Hall.

With various types of mission work as the general trend of conversation, the young men and women, mostly all graduates of Catholic High Schools or Colleges, gathered around the candle-lighted tables and "chatted" and chatted to their hearts' content.

President John Maloney Jr. introduced Father John O'Donnell, former director of mission activity at Aquinas, who briefly outlined the history of veteran units in the United States. In a short summary of the accomplishments of the unit since its inception, and in a terse sketch of plans for the future, Martin Moll, Jr., Director of Activities of veterans, spoke for the unit.

The veteran unit is something novel in Rochester and, for that matter, in New York State. It is the only veteran unit in this state but in other states such as Maryland it is one of the major activities of Catholic young men and young women. Baltimore alone has thirty-six veteran units numbering over one thousand mission-minded people.

Rev. John S. Randall, diocesan director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, is the moderator of this first veteran unit which has recently been named after Fr. Patrick Cleary, M.M., a Rochesterian now in Peking, China. Plans have been laid for the establishment of more veteran units in the diocese and anyone no longer attending high school is perfectly welcome to join the veterans.

Each newly formed unit will adopt either a local, a foreign, or a home mission, and will support that mission under the three-fold purpose of the crusade, prayer, study and sacrifice. A fourth purpose of the veterans unit is the promotion of social contacts among Catholic young men and Catholic young women. 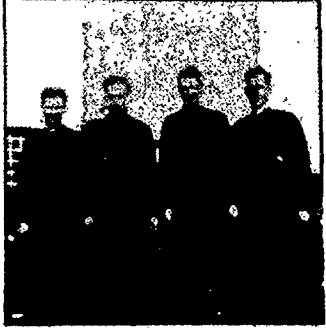

La Salette Missions Call Youth From Here

The Rochester youth who won the oratorical honors in New York State during the Rochester Centennial Exposition is now studying to be a missionary at the Major Seminary of Our Lady of La Salette, Altamont, N. Y.

He is Brother Stanley Matuzewski, brother of the Rev. L. J. Matuzewski, assistant pastor of St. Stanislaus Church, Rochester.

The Institute of the Missionaries of La Salette is one of the few congregations of the Church, if not the only one, which bears the name of an apparition of Our Lady, to which it owes both foundation and aim.

On Sept. 19, 1846, the Mother of God appeared to two children on one of the mountains of the Alps located in the District of La Salette, a small country parish of the Diocese of Grenoble, in the south-eastern part of France.

It is because of this manifestation of the Blessed Virgin on the Mountain of La Salette, that the society of missionaries bade together under the title of Missionaries of La Salette.

Besides the Seminary at Altamont, N. Y., the American Province also has a novitiate at Bloomfield, Conn., a Junior Seminary at Hartford, Conn. and a Seminary at Enfield, N. H.

Brother Stanley Matuzewski attended Aquinas Institute and St. Andrew's Preparatory Seminary, here. Feeling that he was called to a life other than that offered by these schools, he finished his high school course and completed his classical studies at La Salette High School and College situated in Hartford. After a novitiate year at Bloomfield, Conn., he went to the Grand Seminary at Altamont, N. Y., where he is now pursuing his studies of sacred theology.

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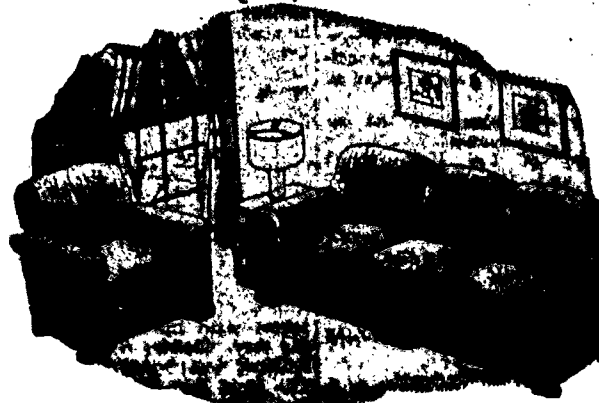
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
