War May Remove Anti-Religious Laws

PARIS.—In the early days of the World War, the Minister of Interior, who was one of the leaders of the Radical Socialist Party, instructed the civil authorities to consider as suspended the effects of the laws of 1901 and 1904 subjecting French Religious to measures of exception, as the result of which many of them were expatriated.

The same step is expected to be taken by the present French Government, but in the interest of justice it is hoped that this time the laws will be abrogated, not merely suspended.

The action of 1914 was not surprising at a time when Religious, who had been forced by these laws of exception to go to other countries to answer the call to the religious life, returned to their native country in her hour of need. History repeats itself and, again, French Religious are returning from abroad to comply with the requirements of general mobilization.

 Marcel Boucher, Deputy from the Vosges and a member of the Republican Federation group in the Chamber of Deputies, has addressed a letter on this subject to Premier Daladier. He calls the Premier's attention to all before the Chamber before war began, indorsed by 230 Deputies, in favor of the Religious. Does not this fact encourage the Government to make use of its plenary powers in this matter? Deputy Boucher asks. But let there be no further question of suspension, he adds, for the unjust measures should be repealed definitely.

"In 1914," the letter points out, "no less than 2,500 Religious, most of whom had gone abroad to enjoy the liberties denied them in their own country, hastened to her defense, and they defended her so valiantly as to win 2,078 citations. Of their number, 1,131 were killed by the enemy. After which, the heroic survivors again had to take the road into exile or resign themselves to remaining in France by virtue of a tolerant and liberal subject to revocation. This truly iniquitous injustice ought not to be repeated."

It is believed that this measure, not only justifiable but so essential to the good name of France, which would restore French Religious their common rights, should not be delayed. The fact that official censorship allowed publication of both the Deputy's letter and the favorable comments thereon which it occasioned gives ground for optimism.

Restoring Churches Aim of Spain Body

MADRID.—The restoration of devoted churches and institutions which are essential to the religious and moral training of the Spanish people will be a special objective of the new National Council, General Francisco Franco said at the ceremonies attending the taking of the oath of fidelity by the Council members.

The Spanish leader indicated new relations with the Holy See, stating: "A long and illustrious Catholic tradition has bequeathed to us wise and tried formulas for harmony between the two powers, and we shall return to these in order to re-establish a concord which has borne fruits of benediction in two worlds."

The Council, General Franco said, "will establish the major lines of a new order, just and humane; will found the institutions of the new State, will articulate the administration of the new plan, will direct economy so that a rigorous system will eliminate all arbitrariness and join political direction with private initiative; and it will orient with strict criterion Spanish homes and works of culture."

"It is my intention," he added, "that the new Council will fulfill its important commission with full reality. No problem of the Movement or of the State must be withheld from its knowledge."

Alluding to foreign policy, Franco said: "We are conscious of the fact that in liberating the soil of Spain, we have saved the world from a grave danger; in the present European crisis, we are doing as we did before, speaking serenely to the nations and making incessant gestures to prevent the subjugation of any, thus complying with the obligation that fidelity to our history and the Catholic thought of Spain imposes upon us."

Brings Poland War Movies

An eye-witness to the destruction of Poland will come to the Columbus Civic Center auditorium Sunday afternoon and evening to present his own pictures taken under the auspices of the Polish Relief Committee.

He is Julien Bryan, world-famous free lance photographer who remained on duty during the siege of Warsaw and then managed to slip through the German lines with his uncensored pictures of that horrible event.

Bryan's appearance here is his first public lecture in the United States since his return from the European battlefields last month. He is bringing with him, as well as motion pictures of Poland before, during and after the invasion which started the present European war.

The Polish Relief Committee which is sponsoring the Bryan pictures, has arranged the proceeds of the event to the American Red Cross for the relief of the war victims in Poland.

The Rev. Joseph Balcerak, pastor of St. Stanislaus Church, is a member of the Polish Relief Committee. This week he issued a general invitation to all Catholics in the diocese to see and hear the story of Poland's destruction.

The Bryan matinee will get underway at 2:30 P. M. with the evening showing scheduled for 8:30 o'clock.

Tickets, priced at 50 cents and \$1 are on sale at the Columbus Civic Centre, Powers Hotel and the Seneca Hotel. They also may be obtained from any member of the Polish Relief Committee.

Godless Struggle Develops in Poland

Specifically, these papers were formerly instructed to refrain from all attacks on what is called "atheistic communism," and no reports of anti-religious measures taken by the Soviet regime must be published.

Also, books criticizing Communism or glorifying anti-Communist activities of the Nazi party are now being retired from all German libraries and book stores. Particularly this applies to all the books recounting the deeds of the "Legion Condor" in Spain. This legion was the very symbol of anti-Communism in Germany on account of its military activities against the Reds in Spain.

In the Nazi press, and on Nazi radio stations, the term "Communism Russia" has become taboo and is no longer admissible. "Soviet Russia" or "Russia" instead, which clearly indicates that the Nazi regime is making a desperate effort to make the German people forget how all the premises on which Hitler started his "revolution" had been based on a fanatical hatred of Marxism and Communism against who Hitlerism was to provide definite guarantees for the nation.

Now suddenly all this violent campaigning must be obliterated from the minds of the people, who are made to believe that Stalin has become "a Marxist" with Hitler meeting him half-way.

Round Table Told of Earth's Make-up

"Echo soundings have revolutionized oceanic surveying," said Dr. J. Edward Hoffmeister at the Fall meeting of the High School Branch of the Catholic Round Table of Science, which was held Saturday, November 4, at the University of Rochester.

The time required for sound originating on the side of a vessel to strike the ocean floor and bound back to the receiving apparatus has proved a very quick, accurate measure of the ocean's depth. Conclusions from many such soundings have revolutionized our knowledge of the ocean bottom. No longer is that floor considered to be a flat surface, broken only by a few ridges, but known to have many irregularities. Ridges, plateaus and canyons, some wider and deeper than the Grand Canyon of the Colorado, form parts of continental shelves hidden by its waters.

The continents which are surrounded by oceans and into which these oceans make frequent inroads, are composed of a veneer of sedimentary rock and lava resting upon a foundation of ancient, weathered, metamorphic and igneous rock. This little rock forms also the ocean floor.

The old concept of the interior of the earth as a molten mass has given way to a new concept that of its solidity. The seismographs, recording earthquakes, show that the velocity of transverse waves through the earth increases with the depth down to 1,800 miles below the earth's surface. "As transverse waves cannot go through a liquid, this demonstrates that the earth is solid at least to a depth of 1,800 miles," said Dr. Hoffmeister.

"The effect of the tidal pull on the earth indicates, according to the speaker, that the earth is a rigid body with the rigidity of steel.

A luncheon preceding the address was held at the Faculty Club where the group were guests of the lay members with Harold J. Kemp as their chairman.

Religion in Prison
 A popular misconception about the religious affiliation of persons sentenced to penal institutions was challenged by the Rev. Eligius Weil, O.F.M., chaplain at the Illinois State Penitentiary, Joliet, Ill., who addressed a session Monday night.

"It is extremely rare that one is sentenced to our penal institutions knowing the bare rudiments of Christianity," Father Weil said. "The greater majority of the inmates, at the time of their incarceration, cannot prove to their own satisfaction the existence of God, the Divinity of Christ or the establishment of a church."

"They do not know the Ten Commandments or the six main precepts of the Church and cannot even name the Seven Sacraments." Coupled with their ignorance is the prejudice instilled by decades of many years and developed by the reading of irreligious literature which is preferred because of the hope of finding justification for the lack of morals and anti-social tendencies.
