Catholic Students Vote Against U. S. **Entry Into War**

NEW YORK.—Catholic college students oppose the entry of the United States into the present strife in Europe: believe however the United States will eventually be drawn into the conflict. do not believe intervention by this country on the side of the Allies will make for stable peace in Europe. favor a national referendum on the question of American partici-pation in the war, and do not choose to fight.

These attitudes are indicated in These attitudes are indicated in the results so far obtained in the poll being conduction by America, national Catholic review published by the Jesuit Fathers here. One hundred and eighty Catholic universities and colleges are participating in the poll and in these institutions 52,000 students have voted: Tabulations to date appear in the current issue of America.

To the question, "Do you, personally, favor the entry of the United States, as an armed force into the present European War² a heavy majority of the students 44,072 as against 1.125-gave negative replies. Some 481 were doubt-

Another staggering majority of students answered "No" to the question, "Would American interquestion, "Would American intervention in the European War on the side of Great Britain and France lead to the creation of a stable peace in Europe?" A total of 36,102 thought not, 3,047 replied "Yen," and 6,384 were doubtful A national referendum on war in this country is heavily favored.

Conscientious objectors rank sec ond in the tabulation on the ques-tion (to men) "On the supposition that the United States declared war today under conditions existing today and that the Govern-ment proposed to send soldiers sailors and airmen to fight in Europe would you consider it your duty to volunteer to accept conacription to be a conscientious ob-jector and to women. Would you consider it a duty for your brothers, men friends etc to vol-unteel, to be conscripted to be conscientious objectors?" Those who favor volunteering number 21 969, those who would accept con-scription, 21 092 and conscientious objectors totaled 18 164

to anticipate international events in order that he may drill NBC's announcers and news reporters in the pronunciation of geo-graphical and biographical names certain to be involved. two or three hundred words which he believes will be much in the news, and types them into a loose leaf notebook, both as they ordinarily are spelled and in his own simplified system of phonetics. Then he coaches the announcers in the pronunciation of such things as Helsinki, Kristianopel, Kaschaukassa and Passikivi, so that no carping critic may amplain when they are used on the air.

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
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
