

Catholic Students Vote Against U. S. Entry Into War

NEW YORK—Catholic college students oppose the entry of the United States into the present straits in Europe, believe, however, the United States will eventually be drawn into the conflict, do not believe intervention by this country on the side of the Allies will make for stable peace in Europe...

To the question, "Do you, personally, favor the entry of the United States, as an armed force into the present European War?" a heavy majority of the students 44,072 as against 1,125 gave negative replies. Some 481 were doubtful.

Another staggering majority of students answered "No" to the question, "Would American intervention in the European War on the side of Great Britain and France lead to the creation of a stable peace in Europe?" A total of 36,102 thought not, 3,047 replied "Yes" and 8,364 were doubtful.

A national referendum on war in this country is heavily favored, 34,028 replying in the affirmative and 9,010 in the negative to the question, "Should there be a national referendum before the United States declares war and pledges to send American soldiers to engage in a European War?"

Conscientious objectors rank second in the tabulation on the question "Do you consider it your duty to volunteer to accept conscription in a conscientious objector and to women? Would you consider it a duty for your brothers, men friends etc. to volunteer to be conscripted to be conscientious objectors?"

Consistent objectors to these who favor volunteering number 11,996 those who would accept conscription 21,992 and conscientious objectors totaled 18,164.

In the committee's report to the Bishop it is pointed out that "the department stores were also receptive to the aims and objectives of the campaign, and have removed from sale all banned magazines. Some difficulties were met in overcoming objections on the part of downtown corner newsstands and is the same difficulty being experienced in practically all other downtown campaigns. We are working on several angles in this connection and hope to report progress at a later date."

Frequent contact was made by the Holy Name Union committee with the National Committee in the campaign, and the Most Rev. John F. Noll, Bishop of Fort Wayne, national chairman.

Bishop Noll has shown that he is vitally interested in the work carried on in the Diocese of Rochester and will incorporate the results in a general report of the national campaign's progress to be presented to the Bishops' meeting in Washington, next week.

Info Experts Face Second Year As Prey of Precocious Public

For those to whom no slight yields keener pleasure than that of an expert squirming and suffering as he attempts to justify his title, another full year of unalloyed joy is dawning—for effective with the broadcast of Tuesday, November 14, at 8:30 p. m. EST, Information Please, most popular of interrogations, begins a second year on the NBC-Blue Network under the sponsorship of Canada Dry Ginger Ale, Inc.

As in the past, they will be joined from week to week by outstanding guest experts who will try to cope with the question barrage laid down by one of the largest and most enthusiastic of radio audiences. Since November 15, 1938, when Information Please became a sponsored presentation of the NBC-Blue Network, 76 of these visiting experts have appeared on the program.

On the guest list have been the names of George M. Cohan, Dorothy Thompson, Deema Taylor, Alice Roosevelt Longworth, Gen. Hugh Johnson, Stuart Chase, John Gunther, George Kaufman, Hendrik Willem Van Loon, Ben Bernie, Dorothy Parker, Helen Willis Moody, William Beebe, Alexander Woolcott, Paul De Kruif, Louis Untermeyer, Lillian Gish, and many others equally famous.

More than 750,000 letters, bearing over three million questions designed to "stump" the smart folk who figure on Information Please, have flooded in from every corner of the Union, from Great Britain, Canada, Egypt, the Virgin Islands, the British West Indies, Mexico and Puerto Rico.

Out of all these, only 128 have baffled the wits of the studio staff that serve up the answers—most of the time by the way of reward the compilers of "stumpers" have received \$1,890 in cash prizes. A total of \$3,265 has been paid out in prizes to persons whose questions have been used on the program. The cash awards will be continued, as will the recently-inaugurated prize of a complete Encyclopedia Britannica to those who manage to baffle the best in the brain line.

Westminster Choir To Sing Beethoven At NBC Symphony Festival Concert

The Westminster Choir, one of America's best-known choral organizations, will make its first NBC appearance of the season on Saturday, December 2, to provide vocal background for the presentation of Beethoven's Ninth Symphony by Arturo Toscanini and the NBC Symphony Orchestra.

The choir also will be heard in Beethoven's Choral Fantasy for Piano, Chorus and Orchestra, which will feature Ania Dorfman as piano soloist. The concert will be broadcast over WHAM from 10:00 to 11:30 P. M. EST. It will conclude the six-week Beethoven Festival presented by Maestro Toscanini and the NBC Symphony.
