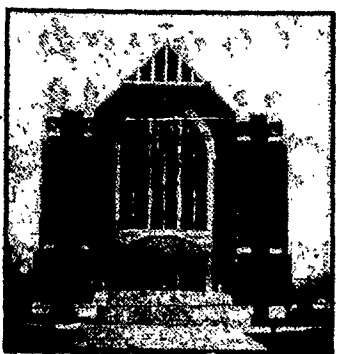

HOEFLER WEDDING

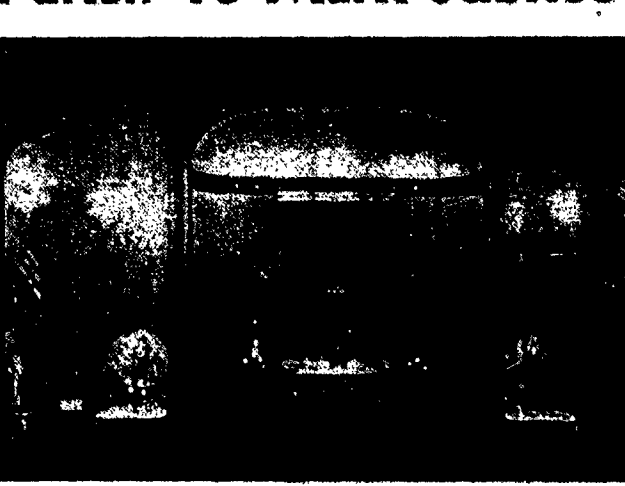
The wedding of Miss Marcella
