Knights of St. John Map National Meet Here

Supreme Heads Come To Give 4th Degree

Supreme officers of the Knights of St. John came to Rochester over the week-end to lay plans for the order's international convention in Rochester next June and to confer the impressive fourth degree on a class of 78 knights in full uniform.

Sessions outlining plans for the convention were held at Powers Hotel with Supreme President Frank H. Blum, K.H.S., of Rochester presiding. More than 4,000 persons are expected to attend the convention which will be highlighted by impressive church services and a huge uniformed parade. Convention dates are June 23 to 27, 1940.

The national officers carried out the ritual of the Fourth Degree in Powers Hotel Ballroom, Sunday afternoon. Assting General Biel were these other Supreme officers here for the occasion: Supreme Secretary, Brigadier General Leo C. Schu, Evansville, Ind.; Supreme Treasurer, Brigadier General Joseph T. Treppa, Detroit; Supreme Trustee, Brigadier General Joseph C. Keim, Dayton; and Supreme Trustee, General Henry A. Leusch, Cleveland.

Syracuse Knights Here
The Rev. Dr. Joseph H. Goffel, chaplain and a colonel in the Rochester Regiment, took an active part in the degree. Eighteen members representing two Syracuse Commanderies were among the candidates inducted.

Guests of honor were His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Healy, Bishop of Rochester; the Rt. Rev. Magr. E. Scoppa, the Rt. Rev. Magr. George V. Burns, the Rt. Rev. Magr. Charles F. Shay, the Very Rev. Stephen Aubach, C.S.S.R.; the Rev. Francis J. Hoeft, the Rev. John J. Florack, the Rev. J. Emil Goffel, the Rev. F. William Stauder, the Rev. Patrick A. Moffatt, the Rev. Edmund Shumann, O.M.C. of Syracuse, and the Rev. John J. Bohmstich, Chaplain of the Rochester Chapter of Chevaliers, Fourth Degree, Knights of St. John. An interested spectator was Mrs. Teresa Ganster, Supreme President of the Ladies' Auxiliaries.

Bishop Kearney Speaker
The lay pattern themselves after their patron, St. John the Baptist, imitating his virtues and being strong in all things as he was, was urged upon the knights by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney at a banquet following the ritual work.

"The time for Knighthood," said the Rev. Dr. Maynard Connell, of St. Bernard's Seminary in the principal address, "is not over. It did not die as so many think with the medieval age. Knighthood is still alive and alert today in you men, members of the Knights of St. John."

Slating that the degree greatly impressed him, Dr. Connell urged the knights to remember that in the Middle Ages, "knighthood was a knightly duty, the layman's supreme ambition was to be a knight."

Major Joseph F. Wendelgaas, chairman of the ceremony and banquet introduced Quartermaster John G. Blinn, who in turn presented Colonel Frederick J. Wegman, commander of the Rochester Regiment, as toastmaster.

Colonel Wegman introduced the members of the Supreme Board and called upon General Biel and Mrs. Ganster for remarks. Music was under the direction of A. D. C. William Schwab. Colonel Frank J. Koch acted as song leader.

Regular quarterly meeting of the District Commandery of Rochester Regiment will be held Friday evening, December 1, in headquarters, Franklin Street.

There were musical sections by the Bishop and the choir, among which was "Adore and Be Still," a presentation by the Bishop to the choir.

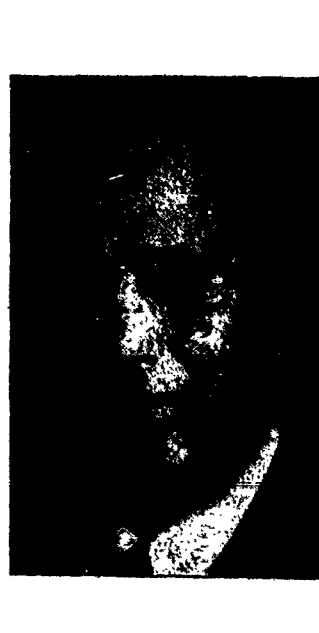

K. C. Tribute To Rombaut Set Dec. 7

To pay tribute to Leo F. Rombaut who retired this year after three terms as Grand Knight, members of Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus will tender him a testimonial on Thursday evening, Dec. 7, at the regular council meeting in Columbus Civic Centre.

The program will begin at 8:15 o'clock. Presentation of the testimonial will be made by Past Grand Knight, Daniel P. Fitzgerald.

Rombaut who is now Council treasurer, was elected a council officer first in 1929 when he became warden. He served in that office until 1935 when he was elected deputy grand knight.

During his three terms as Grand Knight from 1935 to 1939, the Council conducted a wide variety of activities. The Catholic Activities program was fostered and special lectures by Luis Bermillo, Spanish, was veteran, Dr. Rose J. Hoffman of New York; Dr. George Herman Derry and Paul McGuire of the Supreme office lecture bureau were given for the public.

The Passion Play as produced under the direction of the Rev. Aidan English, C. of Dunkirk, was sponsored by the K. of C. during the Rombaut administration.

Headed by Past Grand Knight, John J. McInerney, former heads of Council, now living, will attend. The entertainment program will be directed by Lecturer Jack Ward, Grand Knight Joseph P. Flynn will preside at a short business session.
