**Noted Doctor Dies; Was Auburn Native**

AUBURN — Dr. Thomas J. Arundel, widely known physician a native of Auburn, died Wednesday, Dec. 6 in Youngstown, Ohio, where he had practiced his profession since shortly after his graduation from Albany Medical College in 1897.

Born in this city July 4, 1868, the son of William Arundel, a railroad builder, Thomas J. Arundel lived as a boy on the William H. Seward estate. He attended Auburn High School.

For a few years, Doctor Arundel worked on Auburn newspapers. His pre-medical work he took at Union College, then going to Albany Medical College from which he graduated with the M. D. degree. Before going to Youngstown, the young physician served for a time on the staff of St. Peter's Hospital at Albany and then spent a few months in practice at Montpelier, Vt.

Doctor Arundel was active in the service of the Church, and a leader in the Knights of Columbus. Soon after the United States entered the World War, Doctor Arundel was sent to Paris as examiner and physician on the Knights of Columbus staff. When some American nurses contracted smallpox in an epidemic in Rome, Doctor Arundel was sent from Paris to Rome.

Doctor Arundel received the Papal Cross from Pope Benedict XV for his services during that period. He was at the Vatican when the first American soldiers were received by Pope Benedict and also when the Pontiff received President Wilson.

Besides being a charter member of the Knights of Columbus Council in Youngstown, he was a member of the country and national medical associations.

Among Doctor Arundel's survivors are: Miss Margaret Arundel of this city, a sister, and William Arundel, a brother, also of Auburn.

Doctor Arundel is also survived by his wife, Bridget Dignan Arundel, two daughters, Mrs. Harry Evans of Girard, Ohio and Mrs. Ivan Smith of New Jersey, also another sister, Mrs. William McAviney of Springfield, Mass., and three grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Saturday in St. Columba's Church, Youngstown.

**Priest's Mother Dies at 74**

Mrs. Jeremiah Gerber Mahoney, 74, mother of the Rev. Charles J. Mahoney, assistant superintendent Catholic Schools, Diocese of Rochester, died today (Thursday Dec. 14) at the home of her daughter, Mrs. John M. Blackwood, 3033 St. Paul Boulevard.

Mrs. Mahoney had been ill a few months. Born June 29, 1865, in East Bloomfield, Mrs. Mahoney had been a resident of Corning since 1894. She was the widow of Jeremiah Mahoney of Corning, who died in 1927.

Besides Father Mahoney and Mrs. Blackwood she is survived by two other daughters Mrs. Harold Driscoll of Hamburg, N. Y. and Mrs. Frank Purcell of Corning, another son, R. Floyd Mahoney, three sisters, Mrs. Peter Neenan of East Bloomfield, Mrs. Harvey Mittemore of Ivesdale and Mrs. William Tobin of Canandaigua, one brother, George Gerber of Corning and nine grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Monday morning at St. Mary's Church, Corning, at 10 o'clock.

**Mother of 3 Maryknoll Missioners Dies**

PITTSBURGH. — Mrs. Michael J. Donovan, the mother of three Maryknoll missioners, has died at her home here.

The death of Mrs. Donovan recalls a picture of this heroic mother given by eye-witnesses of the scene two years ago when the body of her youngest priest-son, Rev. Gerard A. Donovan, was brought to this country from his mission post in distant Manchukuo where he was slain by bandits. Father Gerard had been captured by the bandits, and after four months of enforced hardship, was strangled to death. The body was brought home for interment in the Maryknoll cemetery.

When some one expressed to Mrs. Donovan their sympathy for the tragic loss this truly Christian mother remarked quietly it is a small price to have to pay for having three priestly sons.

Father Thomas Donovan happened to be home on Furlough from his mission in South China when his mother was taken ill and he had the happiness of attending her in her last moments. The third priest-son is Father Joseph Donovan, of Maryknoll, N. Y.

Mrs. Donovan also is survived by her husband, and her son, Michael J. Donovan, Jr., Bradford, Pa., and two daughters, Miss Catherine Donovan and Mrs. J. F. Kelly.
