LONDON The late Earl of

Cardinal's Last Words
At Christmas Recalled

In what proved to be his last
Christmas message to his flock,
the late George Cardinal Mun-
delein, Archbishop of Chicago, said
in The New World, his archdiocesan
newspaper last December, that
at Christmas there is no need for
sorrow "even in the homes in
which there is a vacant place at
the table."

"Surely, we who do understand,
should be foremost in our celebra-
tion of the birthday of our God
and King," the Cardinal said.
"Leaving aside all sorrow and dis-
appointment, forgetting for the
day pain, sickness, poverty, and
joining in the chorus of happiness
that should animate us, because
the heavenly Babe Who came to
the cold bare manger in Bethle-
hem may now find a warm wel-
come place in our hearts. And even
if the homes in which there is a
vacant place at the table there
need be no sorrow or loneliness
for we who believe in the
Communion of Saints, we realize
that as we kneel about the crib of
the Infant Saviour on the great
family feast of Christmas, those
who have gone before us into eter-
nity kneel by our side adoring the
Christ-Child, we in His presence on
the altar, they face to face in
Heaven."

Holy Rosary Church Makes
Notable Record In 50 Years

A small Catholic Mission organ-
ized in 1889, what was then
known as "Glenwood" in this city
has become today in the pastorate
of the Rt. Rev. Magr. Charles F.
Shay, the thriving and prominent
city parish of Holy Rosary.

The Golden Jubilee of Holy
Rosary parish, being fittingly
marked beginning Sunday will
bring to mind those Bishops,
Priests, Sisters and people who
down through the fifty years
worked zealously to develop spiri-
tually and materially in the parish
a record of achievements which
will be widely noted.

The parish was first organized
under the direction of the late
Bishop Bernard J. McQuaid as a
Mission of St. Patrick's Cathedral.
Carrying on the work was the
Very Rev. James P. Kiernan, V.G.,
rector of St. Patrick's Cathedral
and associated prominently with
him was the Rev. John G. Van
Ness.

Laying of the cornerstone of the
first church located on the corner
of Rowe (now Lexington Avenue)
and Finch Streets took place on
Holy Rosary Sunday, Oct. 5, 1890.

The first church of Holy Rosary,
a small chapel building accom-
modating 38 persons, was solemnly
dedicated by Bishop McQuaid, on
New Year's Day, 1891. A school
building in the rear was erected
at the same time. The school in
charge of Sisters of St. Joseph.

Growth of the parish was rapid.
In July, 1898, Father Van Ness
was made first permanent pastor.
The first parish rectory was ac-
quired in 1890.

A decision to erect a combina-
tion church and school for Holy
Rosary Parish at the cost of \$30,-
000 resulted in the cornerstone be-
ing laid by Bishop McQuaid on
June 18, 1904. This building now
serves as Holy Rosary School.

Dedication of the new and sec-
ond church, also planned, took
place on Dec. 4, 1904. The
same day the greatly cherished
Holy Rosary Church bell was
blessed and rung for the first time.

The parish was thrown into deep
mourning on Feb. 17, 1908, when
their beloved pastor, Father Van
Ness, passed to his eternal reward.

Or Feb. 25, 1909, Bishop Hickey
appointed the Rev. James H. Day
as pastor of Holy Rosary Church.
During Father Day's pastorate the
convent for the Sisters of St. Joseph
was built in 1911. Father Day
died Jan. 29, 1914.

The third pastor of Holy Rosary
Church was the Rev. Arthur A.
Hughes appointed by Bishop Hickey
on Feb. 17, 1914. During
Father Hughes' pastorate the Sil-
ver Jubilee of the parish was ap-
propriately observed.

Continued growth and progress
in the parish resulted in Father
Hughes seeing the necessity for a
larger church and planning ac-
cordingly. After much study of
Spanish Mission churches, in the
southwest, Father Hughes an-
nounced plans for building the
present church and rectory at a
cost of \$60,000.

Ground was broken, April 12,
1916, and cornerstones for the beau-
tiful new Spanish Mission Church
was laid on May 21, 1916, by
Bishop Hickey. Solemn dedication
of the church with Bishop Hickey
officially took place on Oct. 29,
1916, in the month of the Holy
Rosary. Interior decoration of the
church took place in 1927 at a
cost of \$12,000.

Two more outstanding events in
the pastorate of Father Hughes
were the Fortieth Anniversary
Celebration, Jan. 10, 1930, at which
Bishop O'Hara officiated and the
election of Father Hughes to the
rank of domestic prelate of the
Papal Household with the title of
Right Reverend Monsignor, Feb.
13, 1932. Elevated at that same
time was Monsignor Shay, then
pastor of the Cathedral and now
pastor of Holy Rosary Church.

Monsignor Hughes died on Mar.
13, 1932. His death completed
eighteen years of zealous and fruit-
ful work as pastor of Holy Rosary
Church.

Bishop O'Hara appointed the
Rev. Walter A. Foery, Ph.D., as
pastor of Holy Rosary Church on
June 17, 1932, when the Arch-
bishop of New York, Joseph P.
Mooney, and Mr. and Mrs. John
