**'Un-Catholic' Attitude Toward Negroes Scored**

**NEW YORK (N. C.)**—The Church's apostolate to the American Negro is being hindered by the "Un-Catholic" attitude of many white Catholics towards Negroes, the Rev. William J. Walsh, pastor of St. Ignace Church, Philadelphia, said here Sunday at the fifth anniversary celebration of the founding of the Catholic Interracial Council.

Attending the celebration were several hundred priests and laymen, both white and colored, engaged in interracial work. The guest of honor was the Rev. John LaFarge, S. J., editor and sociologist, who, with a group of white and colored Catholics, founded the Catholic Interracial Council in 1935. The council promotes the spiritual and material welfare of the American Negro.

Father Walsh emphasized that educated Catholics must face the interracial problem "in a Catholic and statesmanlike manner." Then they must first change their own attitude towards the negro, and second help to change that of other Catholics by added "Un-Catholic Attitude."

"Until Catholics as a whole change their attitude towards the Negro," he said, "they see the Negro not as a parish but the flesh of their flesh and the bone of their bone the Negro Apostolate shall continue along in a half-hearted manner."

But how restore a universal norm of morality? he asked. "By a return to conscience. Here are the basic teachings of the Catholic Church on the problem. The foundation of a universal moral judgment is conscience which is a reflection of God's Eternal Reason and Holy Will ordaining us to preserve order in His universe and through it to come to self-perfection. It is the light of the intellect and will thus become judged not in terms of my interest or my pleasure or those of our race or class or our nation, but in terms of the purpose for which we all were made, namely God."

Christians, Monsignor Sheen went on, are agreed that the Person of Christ is the perfection of the Law of Conscience, but the Catholic has added a whole aspect of God's Life and that Father Walsh said that the consummation of the Law of God and the forgiveness of God to our weak, weary consciences can not forget that Our Lord communicated that Truth and that Life and that Forgiveness to man even to the consummation of the world.

"Where that Truth that Life, and that Forgiveness are I shall not tell you because I do not want you to take my word for it," Monsignor Sheen said. "But I will tell you how to find it. Get down on your knees every day and ask God to lead you to the knowledge of the person of Christ and to give you the strength to follow that Truth when you see it. God will do the rest. Just try it."

**Urges Universal Norm of Morality**

**NEW YORK (N. C.)** The cause of modern ills is the lack of a universal norm of morality which can be gained by a return to conscience, declared the Rev. Mag. Fulton Sheen Sunday night in his address over the Catholic Hour.

Quoting Pope Pius XII's first Encyclical Summi Pontificatus, Monsignor Sheen said by a universal norm of morality the Holy Father obviously means a standard of morality that has reference to human nature that is applicable at all times and all places not one which is grounded on particular interest.

**Back to Conscience**  
 Monsignor Sheen declared that today men refuse to admit that there is anything wrong saying that in the past though men did wrong they admitted there was such a thing as wrong and therefore they needed to do penance and return to God.

**Retired Denver Ordinary, Bishop Thien, Dies**

**WICHITA, Kan.**—The Most Rev. J. Henry Thien who in 20 years in the episcopate governed first the Diocese of Lincoln and then the Diocese of Denver, died at St. Francis Hospital here, yesterday at the age of 78.

Bishop Thien came to St. Francis Hospital shortly after resigning the See of Denver in 1931. He was paralyzed by a stroke he suffered in March, 1938.

As a builder, Bishop Thien has left many monuments behind him in churches and schools in the Wichita, Lincoln and Denver dioceses. His last major building project was the beautiful St. Thomas Seminary in Denver, provincial seminary for the Santa Fe province. Another Denver project which especially delighted Bishop Thien was his institution of the "Blessed Sacrament" in which he deeded a magnificent home given him by the Denver diocese to serve as the headquarters of Denver's Catholic charities.

**Congressman Urges Close Of Embassy, Vires Russia**

**WASHINGTON (N. C.)**—Discussing a resolution he has introduced for the discontinuance of the American Embassy at Moscow, Representative Stephen Boyer, a Democrat, said today in the House of Representatives that it is designed to say to the Soviet that we can no longer abide the violation of the agreements made by Russia when she signed her recognition seven years ago.

Recalling the Soviet pledge to stop all Communist propaganda in the United States, Representative Boyer said the "Communist problem in this country has increased more than one hundred fold ever since that commitment was made by the Soviet through its commissar."

Representative John W. McCormack of Massachusetts said a congressional committee he headed had shown five years ago that the Soviet agreement had been broken by the Bolsheviks and that he intends when the appropriation bill comes before the House to make a motion of censure of the appropriation for the United States Embassy at Moscow.

**Fr. Stanford Named College Group Head**

**PHILADELPHIA**—The Very Rev. Edwin V. Stanford, O.S.A., President of Villanova College and distinguished American Catholic educator, this week was elected President of the Association of American Colleges at the annual meeting here. It is believed to be the first time the Association has been headed by a Catholic.

The Association of American Colleges is a national educational group with 350 member colleges and is the largest organization of its kind in the country.

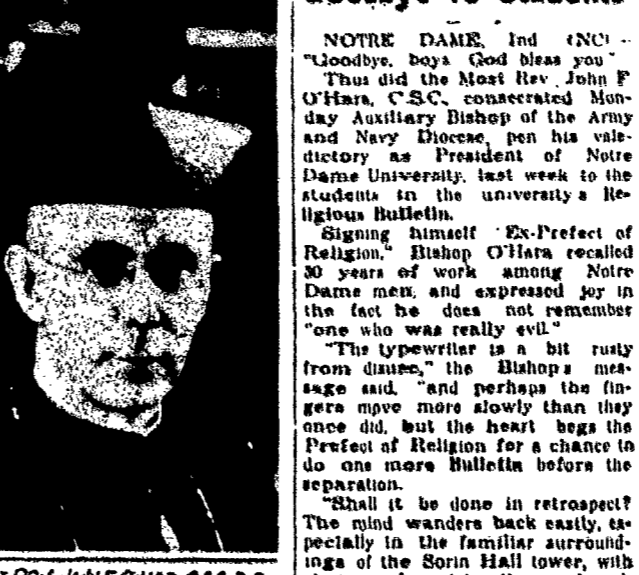
**Noted Catholics On Hall of Fame Board**

pel and thus lay the basis of a happier age."

Projected at this time, the forthcoming Joint Pastoral is in a sense a response on the part of the American Archbishops and Bishops to the suggestion contained in the Sovereign Pontiff's inspiring words in the same Encyclical, Pope Pius XII said it was a source of joy to him to know that the Encyclical had been received with such enthusiasm in the United States of America and that the solution of the social question in accordance with the postulates of the Gospel and of the eternal philosophy are the object in the United States of America and prolonged consideration on the part of some men of lesser intellect whose generous social restoration and the strengthening of the bonds of love amongst men."

"Caucasian men's obligations in his private and public life his duties and responsibilities as an individual and as a member of human society the Pastoral, it is believed, will counsel American Catholics to the points around which most controversy centers today in the field of Social Justice. These topics are: "Ownership," "Property and Labor," "Security," "Wages and Unemployment," "Social Order." On each of these points the Pastoral will set forth the Catholic teaching in the matter following closely the pronouncements of the Pope.

**Distribution of Income**  
 A constantly recurring topic in forums and public discussions, the question of the distribution of income between those who supply capital and those who supply labor may be expected to be touched upon in the Pastoral. Likewise the new developments in the field of labor laws and the subject to which recent legislation in the United States has given great stimulus may be given consideration.

In general it is believed that the Bishops will discuss some long-standing and outline Catholic teaching with relation to their correction. It is a burning desire of His Holiness Pope Pius XII to re-establish the Kingdom of Christ, and it is to be expected that the Pastoral will counsel American Catholics on ways to promote the restoration of Christ to society.

**Fr. Mooney Named On National Youth Group**

**WASHINGTON**—The Rev. Vincent Mooney, S. J., Director of the National Youth Bureau, N. Y. C., is one of 49 prominent persons who have been selected to serve on the new National Advisory Committee of Allied Youth, Inc.

Announcement of the committee was made jointly by Dr. Homer R. Rainey, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, and W. Roy Breg, Executive Secretary of Allied Youth, from the headquarters here.

**Return To God Needed Says Damon Runyan**

**NEW YORK (N. C.)** Civilization must return to God and His teachings, Damon Runyan columnist writes in an article appearing in 133 secular newspapers in this country.
