Launch City-Wide Drive For 'More Knights'

BISHOP ENDORSES K. OF C. CAMPAIGN

Spurred by the wholehearted encouragement and support of His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, more than 200 members of Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus were launched today on a city-wide campaign for new members and re-statements.

In calling attention to the campaign, Bishop Kearney in a letter to pastors declared: "The Knights are making possible a Catholic College education for a great many of our young people who otherwise would be denied that advantage. The organization is consistently meeting the requests of the Church for assistance in different matters. The maintenance of a large membership is imperative for the continuance of these activities."

Two Divisions Enlisted Directing the campaign in which the Army Division is pitted against the Navy Division is William T. Nolan, veteran campaign director who is throwing his full enthusiasm and experience into the project.

Heading the campaigners as general chairman is Dr. James N. Eastham, deputy grand knight of Rochester Council and head of the membership committee. Guiding the efforts of the Army Division is "General" George B. McAvoy, past county commander of the American Legion and active in St. Margaret Mary's Parish. Competing with him is "Admiral" Eugene F. Bopp heading the Navy Division. Admiral Bopp is a veteran Knight of Columbus and holds office in the Albany. He is an active member of Holy Redeemer Parish.

With Joseph P. Flynn as Grand Knight, the local Knights of Columbus unit has been making rapid strides in the last few months in sociality, in Catholic Activity including a successful Communion Breakfast, and three Columbian Forums, in charitable endeavors providing cheer at Christmas and creature comforts for the disabled veterans at Bath and in other Council activities including parties in the club rooms, bowling, choral singing and other events. The Religious Quiz being inaugurated tonight is expected to be an outstanding Council feature.

International in Scope These are not the entire advantages of membership which we are offering to eligible Catholics here. Grand Knight Flynn stated at the campaign opened today "The Knights of Columbus is an international order. Membership in it assures cooperation with not only Bishops and pastors in North America but through the playgrounds established in the Eternal City has meant assisting the Holy Father himself in carrying on the work of the Church.

"In our State Council the support of the Gabriel Sanitorium has justified the memberships of many hundreds of New York State Knights. Scholarships in our state Catholic colleges including Nazareth College here, have been provided boys and girls who were worthy of this sound Catholic education.

Geneva K. C. Join In Marking Press Month GENEVA Geneva Council of the Knights of Columbus will support the observance of Catholic Press Month which is annually held in February. They will cooperate with the New York State Council of the Knights of Columbus.

A call by the Supreme officers and State leaders to join with other groups in the observance has been sent out to the 252 councils in the state. A special appeal from George A. Timons of New York, chairman of the State Council's Catholic Affairs Committee, has gone out to the Councils.

He called attention to the fact that "our five diocesan weeklies in New York State have never served so essentially a part in our daily lives as they do today. They are a post-graduate course not only in religion but as well in sociology, morality, apologetics in short, the general teachings of the church."

Lecture On Canadian Martyrs' Shrine Set

Early history of America will be visualized in an illustrated Lecture and Colored Movies to be given at the Columbus Civic Centre Sunday Feb. 11, by the Rev. J. Lally S. J., Director of the Martyrs' Shrine at Midland, Ontario.

The Martyrs' Shrine has become to Ontario what St. Anne de Beauséjour is to Quebec. Cures and favours are recorded in large numbers at the Martyrs' Shrine.

The spot is of great historic interest. On the grounds are the ruins of Old Fort Ste. Marie visualized by Champlain as an interior stronghold against the Iroquois. It is a black chronicle of merciless warfare between the Iroquois from the State of New York and the Hurons of the Georgian Bay section, which gave to the Church eight martyrs now canonized by the Church.

The Shrines erected at Fort Ste. Marie commemorating the death of eight heroic Jesuit martyrs, the relics of thousands of tourists yearly.

Forum Reviews Work At Labor College

Marking the end of the first series of courses in the Catholic Labor College being conducted at St. Andrew's Seminary, Plymouth Ave. North, a forum was held Monday night to give opportunity to those making the courses to voice their views and discuss the matter treated. About 100 men and women attended.

At the next session on Monday, Feb. 5, registration for the second semester will take place from 7:15 to 7:40 P. M. when classes will begin. Subject matter thus far taught will be reviewed for new students so they can take up the work with those who made the first semester.

A wide range of topics was treated at the Forum, Monday night. Brief addresses were given by the Rev. George Vogt, director of the college, Dr. Aaron I. Abell of Nazareth College faculty. Summing up was former County Judge Philip H. Donnelly who reviewed essential points made by the various speakers. Those heard were John Wain, labor leader who spoke on Labor Relations Laws, Their Effect on Labor; William J. Fuesher, "Co-operation Between Labor and Management"; Martin J. Rooney, "Necessity of Labor Unions"; Margaret Righam, "Does the White-collar Worker Need Organization?"; and Harold Charles, "The Application of a Business Agent and Management Reaction."

It is planned to have another forum in five or six weeks. The course will be continued until early May. From time to time prominent speakers in the field of labor relations will be brought as guest lecturers. A public speaking course is also planned.

Milton P. Fess acted as chairman at the Forum, Monday night. He points out that since the classes were comprised of adults with wide experience in the labor movement the professors were able to gain the benefit of the expressed viewpoint from experienced labor workers and workers.

Conducting the course are the Rev. Francis Burns of St. Bernard's Seminary Dr. Abell and Edward R. Murphy, professor of Law at Niagara University.
