The Holy Season of Lent is already upon us. You approach the altar rail on Ash Wednesday and there our Holy Mother, the Church, tries to us a varied yet very challenging sermon. "Remember, man that thou art dust and unto dust thou shalt return." This pithy statement shall remind us of the origin and final destiny of our life. At the same time it implies that there is a higher part of us that needs more attention than does our body. This is our soul.

Thus forty days of Lent are set apart that we might concentrate upon the care we should give our souls and thereby provide our eternal happiness. We are encouraged to do a little something more than is our customary practice during the year. We should first and foremost increase the number of our prayers.

Undoubtedly Sister has recommended to you additional prayers which you might well add to those which you usually recite. Of course the greater of these is the Mass and I am positive that all of you boys and girls will make an honest effort to be at Mass each morning including Saturdays. The only thing such a practice costs you is giving yourselves out of the first week of Lent. You know, the thought has struck me that so many boys and girls will deny themselves these little pleasures during Lent. Why will you say "No" to candy and nickels then on Eastern Sunday they will break out into a big splurge with all their savings. It just seems to me that such a practice is the real purpose of your sacrifice. By so doing you will postpone for a time that which you might enjoy.
