Elmira Pastor Pleas Invest Cub Pack For Traffic Guidance

ELMIRA Repeated requests for police protection for school children because of traffic conditions has finally resulted in a police survey to see if such protection is necessary.

The Rev. Bernard C. Hanna pastor of St. Anthony's Church has called the situation to the attention of City Manager Kiebas on Feb. 12 and again in an editorial in The Antigonish stating:

We have a school of nearly 270 children and yet we are without the police protection given to other schools in the city. The pastor asked this protection a few months ago from the City Manager and nothing was done about it. Just a week ago in St. Anthony's hall the same request was made in public to the same City Manager and in several members of the City Council and still nothing was done.

We are unfortunately one of the cities in a thoroughfare where the speed law is ignored. Therefore a police protection should be given to the children. It is necessary to have a major accident at our school before our city fathers realize that the lives of our children are near and dear to us.

It seems queer that we must be forced to make this request repeatedly for if the City Manager had our interest and the interest of our children at heart such a request would be unnecessary. It would be arranged without the asking.

The pastor was told that he should be a certain political leader and action would be taken since when a political pull necessary for the safety of our little children.

Manager Kiebas said he knew nothing of any request for police protection made months ago. He said he first received the request Feb. 12 and then directed police to make the survey a report on which he expects to report.

Police Chief Weaver said it would be impossible to assign police to every school daily.

We have 22 men on a shift and some of them have days off every day. The Chief said. Also five of them are on call drivers. If we assigned police to every school we would have policemen left for nothing else. We attempt however to provide protection at the most hazardous locations.
