NEW YORK (N.Y.) - The New York City Board of Education was petitioned to authorize religious instruction in school hours by a resolution introduced in the City Council today by Councilman Joseph T. Sharkey.

The resolution pointed out that the State Board of Regents, on May 19, 1939 recommended to the State Commissioner of Education that local public school officials may authorize the "excuse of children from public schools for instruction in religious education during school hours and outside school buildings and grounds for not exceeding one hour of school time at the close of the session."

Richard Reid To Speak At St. Bona's Mar. 10

ST. BONAVENTURE, N. Y. Richard Reid, prominent Catholic editor and lawyer, will be the principal speaker on the program of Sunday, March 10 of the celebration commemorating the Centennial of Printing to be held by St. Bonaventure College from March 1 through 10th.

Mr. Reid is the editor of "Catholic News" of New York and was formerly editor of the Augusta, Georgia "Bulletin." Born in Winchester, Mass., 45 years ago Mr. Reid was educated at Holy Cross College, where he received his A.B. and M.A. degrees.

He took post-graduate work at Columbia and Fordham Universities, receiving a law degree from the latter from 1918-1919. He served on the faculty of St. Francis Xavier high school, New York in 1919, he went to Augusta where he served for a time as editorial writer on the "Chronicle" and was news editor and columnist of the "Herald." In 1920, he became editor of the "Bulletin."

Richard Reid has long been active in the work of the Catholic Press Association, of which he was president for two terms. He is a member of the board of directors of the National Council of Catholic Men and is prominent in the activities of the Boy Scouts of America. He is also a member of the Knights of Columbus and was at one time principal of the K. of C. school for ex-service men.

Mr. Reid became a leading figure in the affairs of Augusta, where he was influential among people of all creeds and classes. He was president of the Historical Commission of the Augusta Bicentennial commission. Mr. Reid's topic at the St. Bonaventure Centennial of Printing will be "Ethics in Newspapers."

Masons Concentrate On Latin America

WASHINGTON (N.C.) - That Free Masonry concentrate on Latin America as a field for expansion was urged at a two-day conference on international Masonic problems held here.

Delegates representing 45 out of the 49 grand lodges in the United States heard a paper in which it was asserted that expansion of Free Masonry in Europe is "out of the question" at the present time and that the logical place to turn to for growth now and in the immediate future is Latin America.

The paper was prepared by J. Edward Allen, grand master of Masons in North Carolina, and was read for him by John Anderson, grand secretary for North Carolina.

Reviewing the position of Free Masonry in Europe, Mr. Allen reported on how it has been affected in totalitarian states. He told the delegates that Free Masonry in the United States holds a duty to its brethren to the South to develop good will and a common understanding in Masonry.

Doctors Urged To Support Move For Aid of Family

PARIS - Even if France achieves a military victory, it cannot have lasting peace unless it revivifies the family as the nation's social entity by curing itself of the current decadence, says a memorandum of the Physicians' Group of Family Action of the Association of Physicians' Friends of the Family here.

Sent to French physicians, the memorandum urges doctors to use their influence and authority to save our country from anemia and sterility, saying that the tribulations of France "are due in part to its forgetfulness of the laws of the family and to its demographic decadence," a thing it declares, which "has made the enemy believe that we are incapable of offering him any assistance."

"Our immediate sacrifices will be all in vain if, at this time, we did not desire a complete readjustment which must be first of all a moral one," the declaration adds.

Citing the efforts of the government to strengthen the family, the statement asserts that the new political Movement of the Family "will assure the rebirth of our Fatherland, which is now suffering from an extreme individualism, from the burdens accumulated by families often tried in their moral independence."

LONDON - Two hundred consecrated sisters have adopted warships under a plan organized by the Apostleship of the Sea. The girls undertake to pray for the seamen of their adopted ship and to send reading matter and comforts.

Rev. Admiral Sir Henry Harcourt, British battle hero, had written to Apostleship of the Sea headquarters here expressing gratitude for the re-mailing services undertaken for men in his command.
