THE WAR IN THE EAST

Although all eyes are centered on the events in Europe, it must not be forgotten that the abnormal situation in China still remains. The following letter from Sister Mary Immaculate, of Canton, China, prints a vivid picture of conditions there.

"The war which has caused such havoc in our city is not over. It is no longer in the air, the aftermath, the fall of Canton has paralyzed our work in many ways. Our daily work during the first year of the Japanese occupation has been of great variety, and I dare say, exposed to many dangers. Although the river is infested with pirates, we had to make the voyage from Canton to Shanghai. Our poor sisters with their family of 750 lepers were helpless. We shared with them whatever Divine Providence sent us for the 2000 Chinese who, since the breakout, have been crowded into the city.

"During the last few months many of the poor Chinese have returned to the city. For many, life in the country brought on more misery. It is consoling to see all the tiny cots in our nursery filled by the newly arrived babies. The prohibition of all foreign merchandise has increased the number of poor in the city to such an extent, that we have received a large number of babies from one to three years of age. These children could no longer keep from starvation. The Red Cross has assisted us with food, medicine and clothing, thus permitting us to care for more orphans.

"Our Sisters who have taken charge of the Infant Asylum for the last year have had their burdens bantered, fires, financial difficulties. The Government can do nothing to be expected in the New Government, a notable note is yet established. Consolation and numerous baptisms of babies and adults at the hour of death have encouraged our sisters to carry on their good work through all obstacles and vicissitudes.

"Notwithstanding numerous difficulties we have received in our different homes of Canton, all the babies and children that are brought to us. We feel sure that God will come out our hearts for the beautiful hymn of our 'Peace on Earth, good will to Men' be realized in our agitated world."

I think that Sister Mary Immaculate's story makes us realize that there is much help to be given to the work of the Holy Childhood Association. There are numerous babies whom your pennies can save. Some boys and girls are conscious of this fact and during Lent they have been making many sacrifices for this cause.

March 1st to 31st, inclusive, 3 per cent.
April 1st to 14th, inclusive, 3 per cent.
After April fourteenth said addition of 3 per cent and also fees and penalties at the rate of 8 per cent per annum.

In case of default a warrant will be issued for the collection thereof according to law.

On August 1st an additional fee of \$1.50, for advertising will be charged. On the 15th day of August all unpaid taxes will be sold, and can be redeemed only by paying advertising and sales charges, with interest.

A giant 30 to 35 feet tall weighing approximately 2700 pounds would find a perfect fit in what is claimed to be the largest shoe ever made on display in the windows of Bond Brothers, 132 Main Street, East, until Easter week. This large shoe, according to Nat Wiesner, manager of Bond Bros. Department, weighs 37 1/2 pounds. Its manufacturer required 84 square feet of leather, 18 cubic feet of wood and 100 feet of white pine. The sole is made of 100 pounds of the heart of a steer hide.

The size of the shoe would be 122D. Four shoemakers worked for six weeks hand sewing and finishing this foot covering that hasn't a foot to fill it. The polishing job shiner as, from 4 to 5 boxes of polish are used for every shine, plus a quart or so of finishing cream.
