Dr. Boland Warns of Union Threat

ITHACA N. Y. — A move to discredit labor unions is an ill-considered move, Dr. John P. Boland, Chairman of the State Labor Relations Board, declared in an address at the Cornell Institute of Labor Relations Mar. 2. He urged labor effect a speedy settlement of the dispute within its ranks.

"Dispute on labor," he said, "are more ruthless today than in 1913, when the Wagner Act was first subjected to the humiliation

of a decision of an unauthorized court that of a committee of highly-paid corporation lawyers. "Labor has made mistakes, but labor is correcting its mistakes. It is in the industry, the employer, who has the power to effect required changes. Specifically, it is that small retaining section of uncooperating employers, economically strong, but socially illiterate, which has been the burden of blame for America's unfinished way."
