Holy Week Rites Begin On Palm Sunday

BISHOP AT CATHEDRAL FOR SOLEMN SERVICES

With His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, officiating at Sacred Heart Cathedral, solemn and deeply significant liturgical services will be conducted throughout the diocese beginning Palm Sunday.

In every church the faithful will in an especial manner meditate on and commemorate the Passion and Death of Christ on the Cross as the pastors in their respective churches carry out the services reserved for Holy Week.

Attention of the faithful in the Rochester area is called to the fact that they can hear the liturgy of Palm Sunday in the original music of the Church at the Cathedral furnished by students of St. Bernard's Seminary.

Bishop Kearney will conduct a retreat for students of St. Andrew's Seminary from Monday to Wednesday and will preside at a Holy Hour of the Rochester Nocturnal Adoration Society, Holy Thursday night beginning at 10 p. m. in St. Patrick's Church.

Holy Week services at Sacred Heart Cathedral beginning with those of Palm Sunday as announced by the Rt. Rev. Mr. George V. Burns, pastor, follow:

Palm Sunday, March 17 - His Excellency, Bishop Kearney will officiate at Solemn Blessing of the Palms and Solemn Pontifical Mass beginning at 11 o'clock. The St. Bernard's students will be heard in the Solemn Singing of the Passion.

Holy Thursday, March 21 - Holy Communion will be distributed at 6, 6:30, 7, 7:30, 8, 8:30 and 9 o'clock. Solemn Blessing of the Holy Oils by the Bishop will take place at Sacred Heart Cathedral beginning at 10:30 a. m. The Tenbrae will be sung by St. Bernard's students at 4 p. m. Holy Hour before the Retiatory will be conducted from 8 to 9 p. m.

Good Friday, March 22 - Pontifical Mass of the Pre-sanctified, Bishop Kearney officiating will begin at 12 o'clock noon, the three hour service commemorating Christ's agony and death on the cross. The Rev. Augustine Cottar, C.P., will conduct the remainder three-hour service.

The Rt. Rev. Mr. J. F. Goggin, rector of St. Bernard's Seminary will be master of ceremonies at all the pontifical services at Sacred Heart Cathedral.

Holy Saturday, March 23 - Services beginning at 7 o'clock with Mozambique Burns officiating will include Blessing of the New Fire, and of the Paschal Candle, Reading of the Prophecy and Blessing of Baptismal and Easter water.

Confessions will be heard Wednesday evening after the Lenten services beginning at 7:45 o'clock. The Lenten Fast will be brought to a close at noon on Easter Saturday. Strict observance of the laws of fasting and abstinence is obligatory until noon of Holy Saturday.

Solemn Pontifical Mass on Easter will begin at 11 o'clock in the Cathedral.

Seminary Choir To Sing Original Music

Emphasizing the importance of sacred music in connection with Palm Sunday and Holy Week services, the Rev. Benedict Ehmman, professor of Church Music at St. Bernard's Seminary, today made a statement on the music arranged for next week.

Father Ehmman's statement follows: "It will interest many Catholics of the Rochester area to know that they can hear the liturgy of Palm Sunday in the original music of the Church at Sacred Heart Pro-Cathedral next Sunday.

"Particularly interesting is the singing of the Passion according to St. Matthew. This will be sung by three deacons, and by the choir of St. Bernard's Seminary.

"One deacon sings the narrative part; another with a baritone voice sings the words of Christ, the third with a soprano voice sings the words of individuals like Judas, Caiaphas, Pilate, etc. This music is Gregorian, and moves along quite rapidly with dramatic simplicity.

The four-voiced choir take all the parts spoken by more than one: e. g. Crucify Him; His blood be upon us and upon our children; Hail, king of the Jews, etc. The music is by the celebrated Palestrina, and fully bears out the dramatic of the text.

"We have been called such poor publicists for the good things in the Church that I for once decided to blow a horn for the St. Bernard's Seminary choir and the wonderful music to be heard in performance next Sunday and in Holy Week at the Pro-Cathedral. All who come should be prepared with their missals."

Eastern Rite Witnessed At St. Andrew's Seminary

By HENRY ATWELL To appreciate the Catholics of Eastern Rites better and to increase their interest and respect for their fellow members of the Mystical Body, students at St. Andrew's Preparatory Seminary took part in their first Oriental Day, Friday, March 8.

Father Basil Turula, pastor of St. Joseph's Church, only Eastern rite priest in this city, offered Mass in the Slav-Byzantine Rite in the Seminary auditorium. He permitted his vestments to remain as the principal exhibit for the day and returned in the afternoon to give Benediction according to the Ukrainian custom.

The afternoon program consisted of student speakers who stressed the unity of all Catholics in the variety of their solemn liturgies.

John Lynch traced the history of the Eastern Rites in the Tree of Life in his talk, James Lyons described the brutal atheism that has supplanted the Church in Russia and appealed for an interest in restoring the faith by our prayers.

Charles Langworthy explained the customs peculiar to Eastern peoples such as prostrations instead of genuflections. He emphasized the equality of all rites and made it clear that all rites are cherished and maintained by the Church which is the Mother of them all, be they Latin, or Greek, or Slav.

Henry Atwell reminded the students that the prayers after Holy Mass are always for the intention of Russia, thus affording an opportunity to further the apostolate of prayer for unity. He also suggested that the deplorable disunion between the Orthodox and Catholic worlds could be overcome were it not for the mutual ignorance and prejudices so prevalent among the faithful.

Father Edward Lyons, rector of the Seminary, suggested some practical ends that should result from the activities of the Day. Among these was to destroy the ignorance concerning the discipline peculiar to the East, especially in the matter of married clergy.

The theme of Oriental Day was that of Pope Benedict XV who said, "The Church of Jesus Christ is neither Latin nor Greek nor Slav but Catholic."
