**NEWS and FEATURES****Pray For War's Cessation,  
Pope Urges At Easter Rites**

VATICAN CITY—Half a million persons in St. Peter's Square and other millions listening on the radio received the Easter Blessing of His Holiness Pope Pius XII Saturday as the solemn ceremonies of the Church's greatest festival were carried on.

The Holy Father in his general audience went to the Basilica at 9 A.M. accompanied by 18 cardinals. In Bishop of the entire Papal Court, forty thousand persons was said to have attended the service.

Prayer was the keynote of the ceremony, in Latin, offered by the papal jester to the aid of God in his present predicament.

The Pope made his first stop at the Trinity Chapel to adore the Blessed Sacrament and then went to the west end of the apse of the great Basilica where after he was seated upon his throne he received the homage of the cardinals and bishops and the clergy attached to the Banquet.

Creation for Joy

The Solemn Mass began at 10 o'clock. The Epistles and Gospels were read in the language of the various Rites and the Holy Father seated on his throne then read his Latin homily.

The Holy Father said Mass at all hours, affording maximum opportunity for the celebration of the Eucharist.

Democratic in Ponch

The organization of the LCBA has been democratic from the beginning. The Council is made up of presidents and past presidents of the local branches who are eligible to serve as delegates to the Quadrennial Convention and remain as members of the Council until the next convention. Every Branch having a membership of seventy-five adult insured members is entitled to representation on the Supreme Council.

It has been the plan in all of the large cities to organize Central Councils or Diocesan Societies; these are made up of the presidents and past presidents of local branches. Each of these Societies is to be represented at the convention of the League in Ponch during 1940 and the anniversary will be observed naturally at the convention in July 1941.

Quadrennial Celebrations

Quadrennial celebrations are planned for the month of April in each State which may be a week or two days.

A special number in the program for each of these observances will be the induction of new members of adult and postulant classes.

Even the Swiss!

**Tells of U. S. Bishops' Concern For Security Of Lay Workers**

KANKAKEE CITY, Mo.—The deep concern which the Catholic Bishops of the United States have for the social security of the lay workers who are being recruited "in ever growing numbers to help with the conduct of Catholic institutions of education and mercy" was emphasized by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Michael J. Ready, general Secretary of the National Catholic Welfare Conference in an address to the 11th annual meeting of the National Catholic Educational Association here yesterday.

Addressing the opening meeting of the convention, Msgr. Ready asserted that in addition to the opportunity schools have "to promote positively an apostolate for social order" these institutions and all religious and charitable institutions "have an obligation to observe the norms of justice in reference particularly to wages and social security."

The Bishop and others who share responsibility in the management of our institutions have given earnest study to the care of lay workers who in ever growing numbers are engaged in the ministry of education and charitable institutions.

Msgr. Ready said Senator Taft's

recommendations to the Association made in the recent Pastoral Letter of the Archbishops and Bishops of the United States have given the Association "a clear mandate to do what it can to spread the word of guidance."

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
