Fresh from concert triumphs in and about New York highlighted by the annual program at Town Hall which drew a capacity audience, the Fordham University Glee Club will sing here on Friday evening, April 5.

This year's concert to begin at 8 p. m. in Columbus Civic Center Auditorium will be sponsored by the Mercy Guild of the Little Flower, the Mercy High Alumnae and students of Our Lady of Mercy High School.

His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, is honorary chairman and Miss Regina K. Kennedy is general chairman with Mrs. Joseph R. Lara as co-chairman.

Tenor Soloist To Return...
Returning for the last time, Victor A. De Rino, a tenor, who was highly acclaimed last year will be heard as tenor soloist. Richard E. Flick of the same class, also well received here, will perform as bass soloist.

Others taking a leading part in the program will be Robert Thomas, a tenor and Alexander de Rosa, accompanist.

The singers under the capable direction of Dr. Frederick A. Joseph will give the two soloists a present of an unusual amount of individual parts within the program's several numbers.

These men, he said, are far more gifted to acquire the knowledge imparted and in a better position than the worker to achieve the Church's aim to right social injustices and in bringing a return of industrial peace.

'Turn To Christ Move' Can Solve Labor Trouble

Men must turn to "Christ the Workman" and seek his intercession if peace is to come in the relationships of capital and labor, the Rev. William Smith, S. J., rector of Crown Heights Labor School, Brooklyn, told members of the Catholic Labor College here in St. Andrew's Seminary, Monday night.

The progress being made at the Catholic Labor College here won his encouragement. Father Smith was particularly impressed with the first semester notes on Labor History prepared by Dr. Aaron I. Abell of Nazareth College, a lecturer on the subject at the Catholic Labor College. The notes were distributed in mimeograph form to the class, Monday night.

"A Novena to Christ the Workman" is the title of a new pamphlet by Father Smith which will urge specified prayers for ending social injustices, will ask the worker to give an honest day's work and will urge that all work be done with a religious purpose.

The Catholic Labor College is in session on Monday evenings under the direction of the Rev. George Vogt. On the faculty are the Rev. Francis B. Burns, Mr. Jean and Edward R. Murphy. A forum on April 29 is being planned to close the present semester.

Geneva Club Hears Aquinas Teacher

GENEVA - Approximately one hundred fifty members of St. Stephen's Club enjoyed their fifth annual Easter Sunday Communion at the Hotel Seneca on March 24.

Guest speaker for the occasion was the Rev. John Murphy, C.S.B., teacher at Aquinas Institute. He stressed the terrible conditions in war torn Europe today as a direct result of godlessness, greed and hatred.

He suggested that if everyone would learn to love all over again with the finer things in life and strive to know only the best in the world of music, literature and art to ignore Communist propaganda and live up to the principles of his religion, they would be taking the most important step towards restoring peace and harmony in a chaotic world.

Diocesan Charities Appeal Exceeds Goal

BUFFALO - The tradition of success for the Catholic Charities of Buffalo was preserved when the seventeenth annual appeal for the needs of 28 charitable institutions and agencies over-subscribed its goal of \$431,793.33 one hour and a half before its scheduled closing. The final total of the week-long appeal was \$437,260.11 or \$5,466.78 in excess of the goal.

Simultaneously with Catholic Charities a second cause was presented to the contributors—the Associated Appeal for Diocesan Emergency Needs. This cause, described as "Catholicity in Action," and calculated to finance spiritual activities in the diocese, has raised \$63,976.01.

The one appeal with two causes, was under the active leadership of the Most Rev. John A. Duffy, Bishop of Buffalo.
