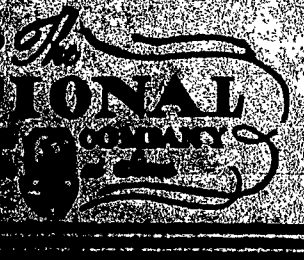

Nazis' Overtures Bring No Sign Of Persecution End

AMSTERDAM—(N. C.)—"No Change" is the status quo of Nazi policies in dealing with the Church in the Reich and no sign of ending persecution can be found in reported Nazi overtures to the Church.

MAN'S SIGHT REPORTED MIRACULOUSLY RESTORED IN ITALIAN CATHEDRAL

VATICAN CITY.—All Italian newspapers have published an account of a reported miracle that is said to have happened on Holy Thursday in the Cathedral of Caserta, near Naples.

Antonio Tamburro, 50, father of eight children and formerly an employe in the State Railways, met with a railway accident three years ago resulting in injury to the brain with subsequent loss of sight. Specialists all agreed that he was incurable.

Every morning the unfortunate blind man, who has become very poor owing to the large number of his family, was guided to the Cathedral by his wife, where he went to pray. On Thursday morning his wife took him to the Cathedral very early to assist at the ceremony and to receive Holy Communion.

During the ceremony he prayed with faith, sometimes not being able to restrain his sobbing. At the moment of Communion he was led to the altar to receive the Sacred Host; and immediately he appeared to be reanimated and reinvigorated. At the end of the ceremony he rose to go away. At that instant his sight fully returned. He refused his wife's assistance and went, alone, to the threshold of the temple.

Weeping, this time with joy, Tamburro returned without aid to the temple and prostrated himself at the foot of the High Altar in prayer.

These who knew Tamburro very well affirm that he was completely blind.

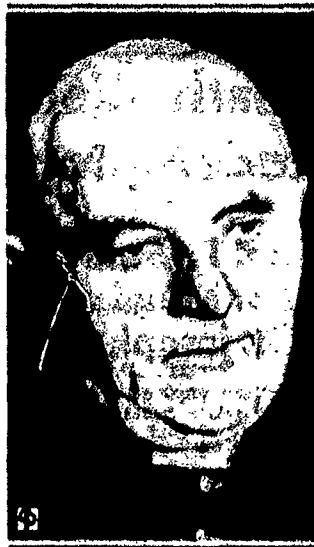

Card. Verdier Of Paris, Dies

PARIS—His Eminence Jean Cardinal Verdier, Archbishop of Paris, died Tuesday morning at the age of 76 years. He had been ill for some time and recently had undergone an operation.

Famed as an educator long before his elevation to the hierarchy and later to the Sacred College, Cardinal Verdier probably will be best remembered as a builder of churches. He built more than 100 new churches in the Archdiocese of Paris.

Appointed Ver Sacro exercised an incomparable influence and his affecting appeals for peace, reciprocal comprehension, and fraternity after the riot of 1934 and the social crisis of 1938, had the most salutary effect upon non-believers as well as his new faithful.

The popularity of the Cardinal surpassed the limits of his diocese. All the provinces of France called upon him to preside at their important religious ceremonies. Belgian administrative commissions invited him to visit them (Szechuan) vaska celebrating the first national congress of its Catholics at Prague expressed the wish that the Archbishop of Paris be designated as Legate of the Holy See.

Warns of Revolt If Almazan Wins

Candidacy Stirs Mexican Senator

MEXICO CITY (NC)—It is not news when the election of a Mexican president produces a revolution. But Senator Gonzalo N. Santos made the headlines when he blandly announced at a session of the Permanent Commission of Congress that Almazan will not get any votes, but if he should get any, we will start a revolution if he does, to keep him out of office.

General Juan Andreu Almazan is an opposition candidate for President. Senator Santos claimed that he spoke for himself and other members of Congress, presumably Senators Perez Mendoza and Gonzalo Bautista who, with Santos, have tried to oust alleged supporters of Almazan from the Senate.

La Prensa ridicules the attempt of these and other members of Congress to convert the Permanent Commission into a sort of "Committee of Public Safety."

Meanwhile Vincente Lombardo Toledano proposes to follow the "checha" system by means of so-called National Committees for Combat Reaction, organized to prevent an alleged revolution and to castigate severely the enemies of the workers and the Government.

The real purpose of the "checha" is obvious. Even those labor groups that have expressed a willingness to remain within the fold of the C.T.M. are asking embarrassing questions about what has become of the considerable amount of money deducted from their wages and sent under the "checha" system since 1936. The least that they demand is an audit so that they will have something to show for the 20,000,000 pesos (about \$3,400,000) collected from which they protest, the workers have received no benefit.

Things are not going smoothly within the Mexican Revolutionary Party either. There seems to be considerable fear in some quarters that General Avila Camacho may have been a good choice as a candidate with a view to getting support in less extreme quarters, but the question now is will he take orders.

Changes in the platform of the M.R.P. after the original draft supposedly the final draft had appeared in the press were attributed to the candidate's objections. Now it is being said that Avila Camacho is calling for the elimination from party councils of Lombardo Toledano, Jose Maria Davila, the brothers Gilberto and Guillermo Flores, Jesus Vidales and others. In fact it seems quite evident that the General is strengthening his own position by pushing overboard professional politicians who have merited public reprobation.

Rumors are circulating that if elected, Avila Camacho intends to make important reforms in the Mexican Revolutionary Party successor to the once omnipotent National Revolutionary Party by consulting the National Confederation of the Popular Sector which would include professional men, intellectuals generally and particularly the Middle Class, that the General proposes that his Government not be of faction.

The National Anti-Communist Labor Bloc has issued a statement condemning the constant agitation by individuals who are exploiting democracy for their own gain, and which predicts that Lombardo Toledano's "checha" will be a failure because the real Mexican workers will not allow themselves to be dragged into "methods of violence" particularly when such activities have no relation to the defense of the working class.

CONVERSIONS IN INDIA THE LONELY MISSIONARY Bishop Tells of New Conditions On the southwestern coast of India is Malabar. Throughout the Catholic World this region is famous. Since 1930, there have been over forty thousand converts. These people come from the Jacobite or Separated Church. The movement began with the conversion of Bishop Ivanoff who is now the Catholic Bishop of Truvania. After a while, Bishop Theophilus entered the Church and became the Catholic Bishop of Truvania. He was followed by Bishop Severinus and a few weeks ago Bishop Durcoron entered the Church. Because of the illness of Bishop Theophilus, Bishop Severinus was made administrator of the Diocese of Truvania. He writes: "By the time my letter reaches you, news of the conversion of Bishop Durcoron will be known. If we are able to judge by past happenings, we expect he will be followed by many. "There is no limit to the number of converts in this corner of God's Vineyard. Every day we receive groups, whole families. Sometimes I wonder why God selected us for these extraordinary graces. "When we became Catholics, we had to give up the beautiful temples we considered our own. Today many of us are celebrating Mass out in the open. We are without chapels or churches. Our people are the same. They miss the well appointed churches they frequented before they became Catholics. Others I know would enter the Church if we were able to build. In every section where a chapel is open, our converts increase. "Please keep us in mind. Every chapel means a new parish. Every new parish means more converts. We can build a chapel for Six Hundred Dollars. We need many. "Will our readers help? Some we are certain could build a chapel. Others can build half—some could send Five or Ten Dollars—seven One Dollar—Please do something. Aye, the Catholic society that cries upon Jesus in daily aspirations, is itself an extension of the Holy Family, and we who are parents thankfully know that our children, if they should be orphaned by our untimely death, will grow up with the tenderness which we desire for them in the home. So. Africa Cathedral Rises From Its Ruins KIMBERLEY, South Africa. Despite current afflictions of the Most Rev. H. Meyning, O.M.I. Vicar Apostolic of Kimberley, has begun to rebuild his cathedral, completely destroyed by fire in December, 1938.

Subscriptions raised for this purpose now total almost \$10,000. A few lay Brothers in charge of a squad of workmen have begun to clear the ground and dig the new foundations.

Argentine Indian Chief Is Baptized BUENOS AIRES.—Baptism was administered at the San Ignacio Church here to Antonio Gomez, chief of the tribe of Toba Indians from the Argentine Chaco.

The chief was also handed 10 Argentine flags blessed by the Prior of Santo Domingo Convent for delivery to five tribes living in the Chaco and Formosa National Territories.

Ruling Affects Parish Schools HALIFAX, N. S.—A ruling of the Assessment Act exempted church buildings and that St. Paul's School occupied two rooms of the church building. The ruling accordingly exempted this school.

In the case of St. Peter's School, occupying a separate building, was ordered to pay. The diocesan authorities had argued that the school was not a church building, but taken over by the local board of school authorities under a working arrangement satisfactory to both parties and that it had become part of the public school system. The contention was not allowed.
