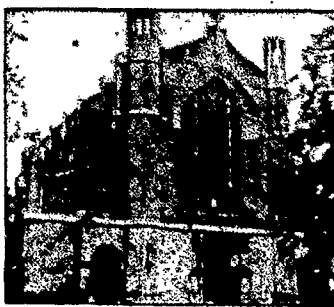

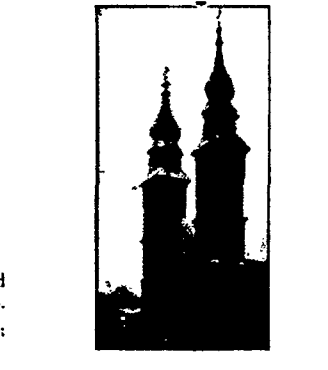

Fordham Glee Club Wins Approval Here

Encore-demanding applause which greeted the Fordham Glee Club in concert at Columbus Auditorium Friday evening demonstrated how well-known these young singers to the large audience and how pleased that audience was with their well-timed program. Lively numbers such as "Nanine's Mother Hubbard" a nursery rhyme given a college education changed the tempo for the audience and demonstrated hours of rehearsal for presentation. Double Quartette Pleasers. New this year was a double quartette in "Wooden Shoes" from Sweethearts by Victor Herbert and "Hound Dog" by Marion Severson. A quartette in capella and with accompaniment were given. In the double quartette were Joseph J. Bukley, Joseph A. Casey, Richard E. Coffey, James P. Courneen, Norman J. Johnson, Francis R. Poles Faith Stronger Avers General Haller

CHICAGO (Catholic) The spirit of faith among the Polish people is stronger than ever before, said Gen. Joseph Haller here upon his return from a long speaking tour. General Haller was in Rochester on Wednesday of last week and met prominent Polish officials here at a dinner in the evening of the Rev. John Balcerk, pastor of St. Stanislaus Church. Later the distinguished World War general addressed a mass meeting in St. Stanislaus Hall. "People of Poland have a strong bond of adherence to the true Catholic faith and they are confident that all will be well," General Haller said. "Everywhere we see great faith in God. This is remarkable by reason of the fact that 90 per cent of all the churches in Poland have been looted by the Nazis. General Haller expressed gratitude for the reception accorded him by the American people. General Haller is to leave soon on a speaking tour of Eastern Europe and plans to return to France about May 1. During Holy Week he and his attendants made a spiritual retreat at the Franciscan Fathers monastery at Ponaski Wis. ANNOUNCE PROGRAM FOR CATHOLIC SUMMER SCHOOL ST. BOOK ASSOCIATES SELECT MRS. KEYES' BIOGRAPHY OF BERNADETTE

NEW YORK (The Sublime Shepherdess: the Life of Saint Bernadette of Lourdes, by Frances Parkinson Keyes, which has been appearing serially in Extension Magazine and which is now available in book form has been made a selection of the Spiritual Book Associates here. A companion volume to "Written in Heaven" Mrs. Keyes' biography of St. Therese of Lisieux, "The Sublime Shepherdess" seeks to reveal the personality of another Saint who has lived, at one time but one whose individuality has been submerged in the wonder of Lourdes. The pilgrim seeking the grotto of glorious revelations, the author says, "is awa primarily of this and only incidentally of the lowly girl who was the instrument of such lofty grace. The apparitions are not omitted but they are grouped according to meaning rather than sequence. The life of St. Bernadette was written with more difficulty than that of St. Therese, the author explains in the foreword. "A Letter to Eleanor Carroll," to whom the book is dedicated. A visit to Lourdes where Mrs. Keyes was received into the Catholic Church last summer was set short by the threat of war. A hasty drive to Nevers, where St. Bernadette spent her adult life in the Convent of St. Gildard was followed by a more precipitate dash to Lourdes, where the author was when war was declared. Under such circumstances the material was collected for the book and most of it was written at Bordeaux, while the author was awaiting transportation home, and aboard the French freighter on which she returned to New York. The volume has 13 illustrations and is divided into three parts: "The Shepherdess," "The Sister and the Saint" It is published by Julian Messner, Inc. A special edition for children has been selected for May by the Pro Parvulis Book Club under the title "Bernadette-Maid of Lourdes."

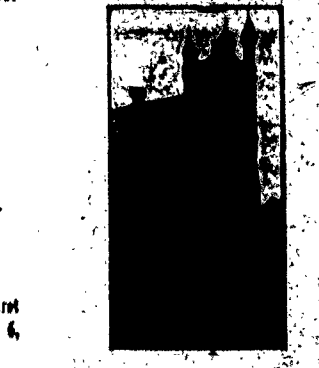
