O'Connell, assistant pastor of St. Patrick's Church, here, declared that Catholics do not want a union of church and state, in a talk before 120 persons at the annual banquet of Court St. Rita, Catholic Daughters of America.

NOTRE DAME, Ind.—Deploring an attack on the appointment of Myron C. Taylor as President Roosevelt's representative at the Vatican made by a Baptist publication, Dr. Edward L. Comper, of the University of Chicago, president of the American Baptist League, says the spokesman represents only a few of the Baptist people of America.

Editorial Quoted

Making a strong plea for tolerance and understanding, the Notre Dame Religious Bulletin had made reference to an editorial which appeared in the United Baptist. This editorial said the religious issue has been introduced into this year's political campaign.

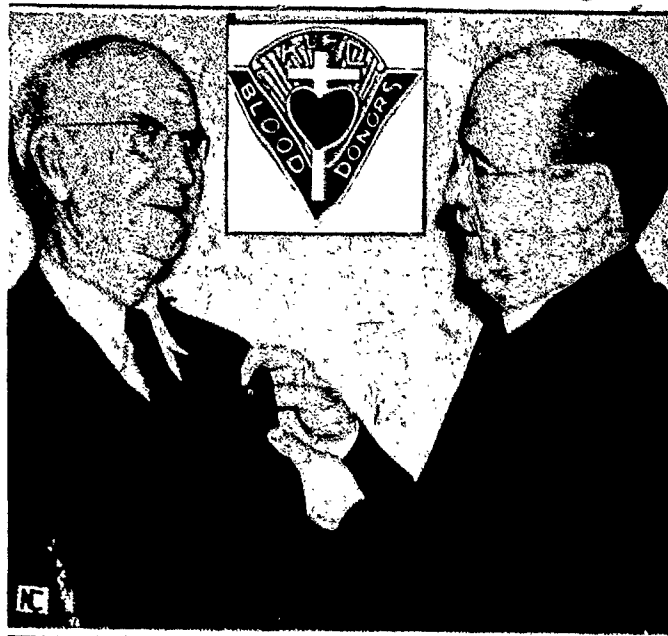
"President Roosevelt injected the religious issue into the campaign when he appointed a staunch anti-Catholic ambassador to the Vatican," the editorial said.

NUMBER TWO—'Statistics Aren't Always Dull'

Statistics, pretty generally maligned, tend to be clear of them as much as possible. But it will be necessary to refer to them this week for the work of the Rochester Catholic Charities must be considered from its own report and this involves statistics.
