## 1940 Catholic Directory Out

### Records Over 21 Million in U. S.

NEW YORK (NC) - A Catholic population of 21,433,136 for the United States, Alaska and the Hawaiian Islands is reported in "The Official Catholic Directory for 1940," just issued by P. J. Kennedy & Sons, New York.

The Archdiocese are 21 numbered by 19 but the Dioceses have increased by one to total 97. The active Cardinals, Archbishops and Bishops now number 134, an increase of 3 over last year.

The latest figures on Catholic population show an increase in practically all of the Archdioceses and Dioceses to the extent of 22,357, but this advance is more than offset by a revision of the figure for the Diocese of Brooklyn. The 1940 report, submitted by that diocese includes in its Catholic population only those who are church-going or practicing Catholics and has not counted the many who claim allegiance to the Church but are not active affiliates, thereby accounting for its figure of 841,226, which total is 229,225 less than that reported for last year.

The actual growth of the Catholic Church throughout the United States during the past year, however, is evident in the fact that in this issue 39 new parishes packed Directory pages are required than were needed last year to record properly the present personnel and institutions of the Church.

There are 202 Seminaries listed with an increase of 31 seminarians over last year, which makes the 1940 total 11,067.

A more exact differentiation between colleges and universities brings the total of colleges and universities for men to 1,442. The colleges and academies for girls are now 683 and high schools for boys and girls total 1,421. The combined enrollment at colleges, academies and high schools is listed at 480,483 which is 39,210 more than last year. There are now 7,397 parochial elementary schools, an increase of 31, with an enrollment of 2,108,892 pupils, an increase of 192,209 over 1939.

Each year the number of orphanages and orphan children decrease, there now are 303 orphanages housing 33,624 orphans. The 1940 summary lists 171 homes for the aged and 703 hospitals, an increase of 24. During 1939 the number of converts rose to the unprecedented high of 73,677, an increase of 7,334 over the corresponding figure for 1938.

The Archdiocese with a million or more Catholic population are Chicago, with 1,400,000; Boston, 1,044,358; and New York with 1,000,000.

The single major change recorded by this year's Directory is the creation on December 14, 1939, of the new Diocese of Gallup, New Mexico. As yet no bishop has been named for this new See, which is made up of parts of the Archdiocese of Santa Fe and the Diocese of Tucson. It covers 6,442 square miles and has a Catholic population of approximately 30,000.

In addition to the many other changes in the Directory, new editorial features include the Alphabetical Cross Index under 120 headings covering all information and data contained in the book; the still further definition of the Religious Orders Section and a more detailed cross index of both this and the Missionary Order Section. The Classified Buyers' Guide and Index has been expanded by more than 30 per cent. The Official Catholic Directory is available in three editions: a paper-bound volume, 1,107 pages, listing data and statistics for the United States and its possessions, at \$4.25; the complete edition, giving data for the United States, Canada and the British Isles, 1,371 pages, at \$5.25; and the same volume in stiff cloth covers, priced at \$6.

**Red Leaders Jailed On Anti-Trust Charge**

NEW YORK - Ben Gold and Irving Potash, Communist leaders in the International Fur Workers Union of the C. I. O., were sentenced April 19 to one year each in prison on their conviction last Saturday of conspiracy to violate the Sherman Anti-Trust Act. The convictions were handed down by Federal Judge William Bondy.

M. Gold is President of the International Union while Mr. Potash is Manager of the Furriers Joint Council. The former also was fined \$5,000 and the latter \$2,500.

Y. - At a Pontifical Mass celebrated by His Excellency the Most Amiable Giovanni Ciochetti, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, the celebration commemorating the one hundredth anniversary of the canonization of St. Alphonsus Liguori was inaugurated here Sunday at the Church of Our Lady of Perpetual Help. The celebration continued this week with 12 members of the hierarchy, 25 monks, more than 200 priests and thousands of laymen participating.

The sermon at the services held yesterday was preached by His Excellency, the Most Rev. James E. Keane, Bishop of Rochester.

St. Alphonsus was the founder in 1732 of the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer (Redemptorists). The Church of Our Lady of Perpetual Help is the headquarters of the Eastern Province of the Redemptorists.

ing, the rest members of relief families. All but a tiny percentage, who had been married at one time, were single.

What happens to the children born in such cases? Well, of the 16 cases posed of during 1939, 16 were placed in foster homes, 15 remained with their mother and others were taken care of in various ways.

These unfortunate girls are aided in many ways by the department of social work and are the placement of their children, but also financially. Also, legal services are available to them.

And there, briefly, is an account of a year's work done by one branch of the Rochester Catholic Charities - the division of Family and Child Care. On the surface, the report is just so many sheets of statistics. But there is more to it than just a mere matter of statistics. There is the noblest work of all - the aiding of unfortunate human beings done well. There is the bringing of comfort and hope and happiness to lives shadowed by trouble. There is the attempt to live up to that maxim, "As long as you did it to one of these, my least brethren, you did it to me."

## Collegians Need Religion

### Newman Clubs Hear Bishop

GENEVA - "Every college boy or girl should have a text book for the study of religion," the Most Rev. James E. Keane, Bishop of the Central New York Province of the Newman Club Federation in session here.

Bishop Keane speaking at the Communion Breakfast in Hotel Sibley was telling the delegates that "religion must be the very essence of a person's life."

Newman Club members were urged to "have a sincere conviction of what is right and what is wrong." The studies of science and art should not push out religion, the Bishop said in advocating the text book for religious study.

"The Church," declared Bishop Keane, "has suffered more from attacks within its own ranks than without."

Ellis Dictatorships

Dr. Walter H. Durfee, dean of Hobart College, gave an address of welcome. He urged the Newman Clubs to take a united stand against dictatorships and to uphold democratic principles. Other speakers included the Rev. John Collins, Buffalo, and Dean Mary McConrath, William Smith College, Northampton, N. C.

John Gennep, vice-president, and Rocco Fiaschetti, retiring province chairman, presided. Telegrams were read from Dr. and Mrs. William Alfred Eddy, and John L. Rickota, national chairman.

The delegates received Holy Communion at the 7:30 Mass celebrated by the Bishop in St. Stephen's Church.

Sylvester Upton, Cornell University, presided at the luncheon of the Central New York Province at the concluding session of the three day meeting here.

Election of province officers followed a communion breakfast in the Hotel Sibley. Other officers named were: President, vice-presidents, Alex. Rutherford, Hamilton College, and Miss Marie Clancy, Onondaga Normal School; Miss Elvira Armbruster, University of Buffalo, recording secretary; Frederick Ferris, Albany State Teachers' College, treasurer; corresponding secretary, Miss Vera Duffy, Cornell University, province chaplain, the Rev. Donald Cleary, Cornell University, re-elected.

The concluding business session was held in St. Stephen's parish house after the breakfast program. Three resolutions approved included expressions of appreciation to the Hobart and William Smith Newman Clubs, to the Rev. Raymond P. Nolan, chairman of arrangements, and to the Rev. Donald Cleary and Rocco Fiaschetti.

The convention passed a resolution approving the decision of Justice Louis B. Brandeis in the Brandeis v. Phoenix case at the City College of New York. Another resolution authorized that a letter be sent to President Roosevelt approving his appointment of Myron Taylor as personal representative to the Vatican.

## Temple of Religion To Reopen at N.Y. Fair

NEW YORK - The Temple of Religion, founded by voluntary contributions from Catholics, Jews and Protestants, will be reopened during the 1940 New York World's Fair. It was announced here today by William Church Osborn, its president.

The Temple was among the most successful buildings at the 1939 World's Fair. Twenty-six priests were among the clergymen who conducted services at the Temple last year. Eight symposia, featured by addresses by prominent Catholics, Protestants and Jews, were held. More than 2,500,000 persons attended its various programs at the 1939 Fair.

John Gilland Brunini, executive secretary of the Catholic Poetry Society of the Temple of Religion, has announced an even better program for 1940.

## Bust of Knute Rockne Unveiled at N. D.

NOTRE DAME, Ind. - A bronze bust of Knute Rockne, famous Notre Dame athletic director and football coach from 1918 until his death in 1931, was unveiled last Saturday in the foyer of the Rockne Memorial fieldhouse.

Mr. Rockne's daughter, Jeanne, unveiled the likeness in the absence of her mother, Mrs. Bonnie S. Rockne, who is in Hollywood in connection with making a motion picture depicting Rockne's life. Present also were Rockne's sons, Bill, Knute Jr., and Jackie.

The Rev. Hugh O'Donnell, C.S.C., President of the university and a monogram football player in 1915, Mr. Rockne's second year as assistant coach to head coach Knute Rockne, presiding at the ceremony, said that "Rockne, the eternal medium of sculpture, in fact, the most permanent of media, is quite symbolic of the immortal Rockne, whose name and deeds are a permanent tradition of Notre Dame."

ST. LOUIS - Another insistent demand has been made here by the Rev. John J. Butler, President of the Catholic Charities of St. Louis, that the Governor of Missouri and Mayor of this city act to relieve hunger and suffering here.

did not abjure high capitalism. He simply hopes to throw the weight of his government's influence in with that of the Pope in trying to avert the catastrophic of a war which, most informed people believe, would most likely result, not in victory for anybody, but in the breakdown of all the cultural values which western civilization has gained during the past 2,000 years. Are not these ministers in pretty bad company?"

False Assumption

"To these members of the Ministerial Association of Elmira and vicinity, let me say that we don't want union of church and state, neither I nor never met an American in the land of hierarchy, priesthood or holy, who is not quite satisfied with the official attitude of our government towards religion."

"I am sure that this action of the Ministerial Association of Elmira does not reflect the attitude of the good Protestant people of this community. It would seem that good will and reflection on their part will persuade them to be more cooperative for the purpose of warding off from us the wrath of the words of Pope Pius XII, the great danger that threatens all alike."

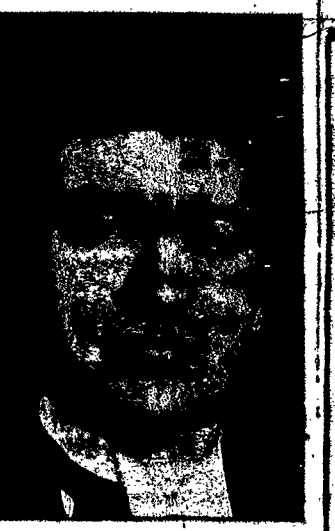
