Wasted Lives New Orleans is not infrequently thought of, or referred to, as a wicked city. In reality, the South's Queen City is not so bad and so immoral as most of the larger cities in this country, to say nothing of Paris, London or Rotterdam. This fact, nevertheless, does not constitute the Crescent City a citadel of righteousness sitting on a high mountain. It has often been said that, if it were not for the constant prayers and penitential acts of the Carmelite Nuns, hidden for life in the obscurity of their convent, New Orleans would long have been engulfed by the waves of God's wrath. The lives of the monks and nuns who withdraw from the world and bury themselves alive in places apart are often referred to by the materially practical worldly-wise Americans as "wasted." Superficially, it does seem a pity that thirty to fifty healthy and well-educated persons should idle away precious time or sacrifice opportunities when so much fine talent is needed in educational and charity work that certainly does look like the death of precious energy. TREE PURPOSE But, who really wastes his life? Only he who brings misery to others and thereby earns his own "tree purpose." One must accept this conclusion, as he posits the true purpose of life. What people can be classified under the heading of "wasted lives?" The very ones, most of the time, who are considered by the world to be most successful, leading very ac-
