Remember the old French farces—in which most of the action took place in and around a bedroom—things like "Up in Mabel's Room" and "Getting Gertrude's Garter"? They went on with the end of the post-war hysteria period, but, glory be, if they haven't come back. At least, that's what "Too Many Husbands" (B), is—even though it makes elaborate pretensions to being sophisticated comedy. There's nothing sophisticated about it and nothing sophisticated about its plot. Toward the end, the picture grows a little over-melodramatic and loses some of its honesty in an attempt to make a conventional ending. But it is still one of the striking pictures of the year.

"Star Dust" (A-1), is very unimpressive, but it is pleasant entertainment. The awful truth is that it really doesn't matter much yet. So far, her pictures have required little except the youth and beauty which Miss Darnell has in abundance. Her pictures are usually calls on other members of the cast for its acting—that grand trouper, Roland Young, for example, Charlotte Greenwood, William Gargan, Donald Meek. The only time when Miss Darnell is at a disadvantage is during a scene—supposedly a screen test, in which her acting has the audience in raptures. It would hardly affect a real audience the way it does those people up on the screen. John Payne continues to show a great deal of promise and is really put over her songs well.

"It All Came True" (A-2) tries to make us believe that Ann Sheridan is an actress as well as an "it" girl. Miss Sheridan's performance belies the buildup. Jeffrey Lynn, newest of the wooden men, is no better. But the picture does give Humphrey Bogart another chance to prove that he is a good comedian as well as an effective menace. Unfortunately, Bogart's role is subordinated to Miss Sheridan's and Lynn's. Una O'Connor, Jessie Busby and Zasu Pitts get few opportunities, but Felix Bressart has a couple of all most heart-breaking moments as the pathetic old magician who has outlived his glory and is no little better than a stooge for his stooge—a dog. Miss Sheridan sings "Gauchito Serenade."

It's wonderful—the way doctors in the movies are always being offered jobs which would throw them smack into the lap of luxury. Usually they accept and before long it has pretty nearly withered their soul. Fisher's doctors, according to the movies, are always worthless no-goods. Not so with earnest young medics like our friend, Dr. Kildare. Dr. Kildare passes up his wealthy opportunity—he may make only \$20 a month, but he has an exciting life. Dr. Kildare's "Strange Case" (A-2), stacks up well with the rest of the series—a good pulp-paper melodrama against a hospital setting, well played by Lionel Barrymore, Lew Ayres and their cast. We hate what they are doing to Eddie Albert. Because he was so natural and delightful as Bing, the slow, blundering cadet of "Brother Rat," they have given him nothing else. He is becoming typecast as the "idiot" again. His latest, "Angel from Texas," is just another remake of that very old chestnut, "Butter and Egg Man"—and a very bad remake. Jane Wyman, Rosemary Lane, Ronald Reagan and Wynne Murray, none of them, give up nothing for Morris to repeat his "Kid Galahad" natural. But we hate what they're doing to Eddie Albert.

MOVIE COMMENTS

gathered in St. Patrick's Church, Plymouth Avenue North, for Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament by Bishop Kearney before adjourning to the seminary. Ethics Seen Answer His Excellency, in a talk following Benediction, expressed his personal satisfaction with the work done by the college in its first year and urged even greater attendance next year. "Because we feel that Christian ethics are the answer to the problems of the man who labors."

"The title of 'Christ the Worker' challenges us as an ideal," the Bishop declared. "The labor movement offers us the best prestige because of the social leaders who have invaded it—men without Christian ethics. When men with moral principles are the leaders, labor prospers."

Man is not a machine, as the exponents of "laissez faire" in business seem to believe, the Bishop stated. Employers and employees, he said, are bound in conscience to recognize that each, because of their relationship, has rights and duties. These obligations, he pointed out, are contained in the famous social encyclicals of Pope Leo XIII and Pope Pius XI.

"You are doing a very important work in spreading these doctrines," His Excellency told the students. "For success this year is an indication of even greater success in the future." Corcoran, active in the Catholic Conference on Industrial Problems, which he said will soon convene again in this city, pointed out as coincidental that the greatest gains for labor were made following publication of the papal encyclicals on capital and labor. New York State ranks first in progressive social and labor legislation, he asserted. Former Judge Philip H. Donnelly in reviewing the year's work urged the class to follow the principles of equity and fair dealing in all labor relations. That code also must be accepted and practiced by the employer to have sound, peaceful relations, he insisted. For either side in labor negotiations to take advantage of the other means future trouble, Judge Donnelly warned. The code, at best can only be temporary, he declared. The Rev. George Vogt, founder of the college, outlined the program for the remainder in the fall. He voiced approval of Bishop Kearney, the head of St. Andrew's Seminary and the faculty members—the Rev. Dr. Francis Burns of St. Bernard's Seminary; Dr. Aaron I. Abel of Nazareth College; and the faculty and Attorney Edward R. Murphy of the city's Department of Commerce.

The Rev. John P. Beland, Buffalo, chairman of the State Labor Relations Board, who opened the college hours last fall, sent a telegram of congratulations. Reversing the usual procedure, William Blaser, in the name of the class, presented the director and faculty with gifts at the close of the program.
