Woe Comes From Turning Back On God, Pope Avers

VATICAN CITY.—(N. C.)—The widespread horror and chaos which confront the world today have resulted from the fact that man has turned his back on the things of Heaven and has actively pursued the things of earth.

This Holy Father, Pope Pius XII, delivered in St. Peter's Basilica the solemn encyclical of the Holy Mary of the Most Holy, Mother of the Good Shepherd, and of St. Gemma Galgani, Patroness of the Holy Eucharist, and of St. Elizabeth of Hungary, Patroness of the Holy Child Jesus.

April 24 was met as the date of the feast of St. Mary of the Holy Child Jesus, and April 11 was fixed as the feast of St. Gemma Galgani.

Reaffirming the virginity of the two new Saints, which he said would be the angels and also the love of God, which he said made them other than themselves in the eyes of others and made them try to communicate his sacred flame to everybody.

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"On account of the immediate desire for human greatness and an increase of power, an account of the reputation of divine law spirits are killed and consequently the rights of Christ and the right of liberty are destroyed in the relations in which man and people are broken, the benefits of justice are overturned."

"A consequence of this is the war which for eight months has covered with blood and tears the map of the globe. We know how much dear to us is the war which already has destroyed immense riches and supported many countries with iron and steel. A few millions have been killed, into exile and in the arms of the new nations from afar. Innocent babies are deprived of their parents. Fathers and mothers cry for their sons taken from them by death."

"Turning our eyes from such terrible things, we raise them on high. And while we solemnly adore the Saviour ascended into Heaven and desire to follow in His traces, let us pray that the Virgin Mary, who study upon His glory that they may look upon us with kindness, and, impetrating Divine Grace, may lead us to that happy country toward which we march with progressive advance."

"May they also obtain from God that all nations, remembering their common nature and common Father and Creator, may cease to be divided by rivalry and re-entrances, and may unite in a fraternal and just peace, and may finally come back to the councils of peace."

"Drawing attention to the fact that the canonizations took place on Ascension Thursday, Pope Pius XII, the Great, who said that the feast of Ascension is the cause of our elevation and that, where previously there can now ascend gloriously there can now descend, provided they are able to follow the example of the Holy Father and St. Mary of the Holy Child Jesus, and St. Elizabeth of Hungary."

Eighteen Cardinals, 60 Bishops, 19 Princes and Princesses of Italy, the Duke of Calabria, the full diplomatic corps, the President of the Republic, Roosevelt's personal representative to the Vatican; members of the Roman nobility, representatives of the religious, scientific and religious bodies with 40,000 pilgrims were present for the impressive ceremonies. Relations of St. Mary of St. Euphrasia Pileolar and St. Gemma Galgani occupied special places.

There being no local tradition for stone architecture, models of classical monuments were sought in the older, nearby countries, such as England and Norway, and so we find that the stone church of St. Olaf, built in 1030, was the model for the Cathedral of Trondheim, dedicated to Christ and St. Olaf. During the next 600 years, this building was enlarged and transported and a nave added. The simple in Norman style, the Gothic removed and more beautiful gothic columns, arcades and vaults were built. The entire west front was enriched with artistically carved statues, the windows placed with the finest tracery of Gothic work. We read there were many very beautiful altars and an exceptional shrine to St. Olaf.

In 1193 a Papal Delegate, Cardinal Breakspere, an Englishman, who later became Pope Adrian IV, visited Norway. While there, he removed the Cathedral of Trondheim from its position under the Archdiocese of Lund in Sweden and made Trondheim the Archdiocese of Norway and its dioceses, which, at that time included Iceland, the Faroe Islands, Greenland, the Orkneys and the Hebrides.

The Cathedral at Trondheim is the northernmost in the world. While it suffered many fires, and for generations after the Protestant revolt was in ruins, it has recently been restored and is now a national monument. All the costly reconstruction being done at government expense. The Cathedral is once again visible in all its glory. Truly, it is "The Crown and the Flower of the Kingdom."

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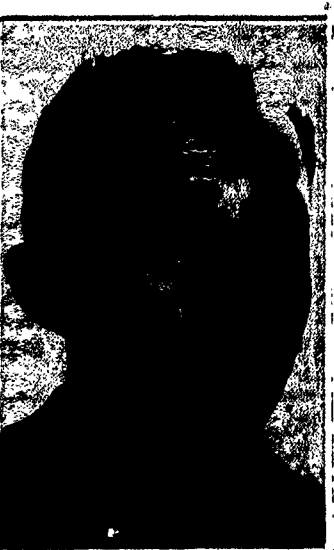

Leif Ericson Sent From Trondheim To Plant Cross In New World

The attention of the people of the Western World is daily being drawn to Scandinavia, and in particular to Trondheim, (Trondheim). After centuries of isolation, this quiet little town in the north of Norway, which was once the center of Viking and Norse life, the capital of the state.

Where is Trondheim, and why is it so important? This city is in Norway, 200 miles south of the Arctic Circle, on a line with the mouth of the Yukon River in Alaska; and just 1,600 miles due north of Rome. It is the third largest city of Norway and in Viking times was the capital of the country. After Christianity was established in Norway, it became the ecclesiastical center of the country—the seat of the Archbishop.

Centrally located on the 1,000-mile coast line, provided by nature with beautiful fjords and harbors, protected in winter by the warmth of the Gulf Stream and in summer by the sea breeze, the country by means of a 100-mile long and fantastically beautiful fjord and various rivers, Trondheim was and is today for these reasons, of enormous strategic importance. From here, one can naturally and easily approach Sweden and all northern Norway.

Far back in Viking times, Trondheim was the gathering place of all the pagan Northerners from the surrounding country. The first deliberate attempt to replace the old religions with the new faith came about 950, when Haakon tried to outlaw heathen practices in the shires of Trondheim. Priests were brought from Finland, presumably from the Norse colony, Danaw. But the attempt was too much for one man.

Ericson Sent As Missionary

The Short Saga tells us that Olaf (Olof) Trygvason, in 990 planted the Cross in this vicinity and that it was from here he sent Leif Ericson westward as a missionary to Greenland. Ericson, however, was blown off his course and landed in Vinland (Newfoundland).

On July 9, 1030, at Stiklestad, just outside of Trondheim, King Olaf (Olaf Haraldson) was killed in battle, organizing for and establishing Christianity in his country. The battle cry of his men was "Fram, Fram, Fram—Krist! Krist! Krist!"—Forward, Forward, Forward for Christ!

This cry was heard once again in far away lands, for in 1110, and in the year 1112, King Sigurd, King Olaf, sailing southwestward to Palestine with 80 large ships and an army of 10,000 men. The Vikings were once again fighting for Christianity. This time in the Holy Land, the city of Jerusalem. King Olaf was killed in the battle. His body was taken to Trondheim and buried in the cathedral.
