

Business Leaders See War Shadow Deeper Over United States

WASHINGTON (AP) — Among America's business men, as well as in the legislative environment, there appears to be a growing conviction that the shadows of war are deepening over the United States.

This was indicated by the discussion at the meeting of the National Chamber of Commerce men when a few months ago it was believed that the United States could accomplish more by holding aloof from the conflict, keeping her resources intact against the time when the shattered world must be reconstructed and a new order established, showed signs of wavering.

A distinction was made in other words between the military and the moral phases of the world-wide conflict. The prevalent opinion still seems to be that the United States should hold aloof from the former, but attention focusing more and more on the latter, which it cannot escape.

The meeting of the business men specifically declared that this country should avoid war in a military sense—but the means of strengthening our moral armament, to resist the encroachment of pagan totalitarianism was repeatedly emphasized.

Some of the business men were of the opinion that the Federal government has already gone too far in laying down rules for the conduct of business and the maintenance of proper employment relations.

The attention given to this phase of the world problem was undoubtedly prompted by the Nazi tactic of undercover penetration. It was taken for granted that Nazism was spreading by infiltration far beyond the actual area of military conflict and that among peaceful peoples who are listed as neutral are many who profess Nazi ideals and stand ready to go against their own countries in putting them in practice.
