#### FEAST OBSERVANCE

The feast of Corpus Christi, the liturgical feast of this Church, falls on Thursday of this week. The solemn observance of the feast has been transferred to Sunday, May 26, when there will be a solemn Mass at 10 o'clock, followed by exposition of the Blessed Sacrament until 2:30 P. M.

The first solemn Mass of the Rev. John E. Kelly will be celebrated on Sunday, May 19, at 10 o'clock. Father Kelly will be ordained on the preceding day at the Pro-Cathedral of the Sacred Heart by Bishop Kearney. He is a priest of the Diocese of Sacramento and after a short vacation, he will undertake his work in that diocese.

The priests congratulate those who have achieved these places and hope that they good example will inspire their fellow students to imitate their zeal.

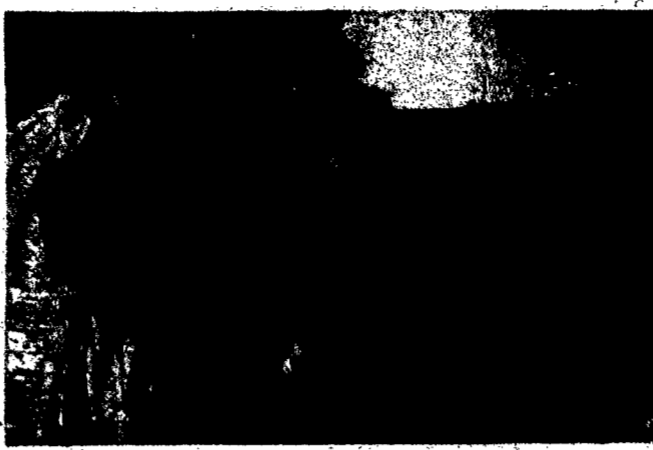

#### The Bishop Has A Jubilee

Sister Thophane gives an interesting account of what it means to have a jubilee in far-off New Guinea, in describing the celebrations which marked the 25th anniversary of Bishop Wolf's consecration.

"This year our bishop celebrated his silver jubilee and a large celebration was held. The mission boat, Stella, went out several times to get natives to swell the festive crowd. The "Ethereas" and "Paul" flew in with food and visitors. Father Schaefer from the Bismarck came afoot with twenty-five or thirty of his wild men, all chiefs and headmen. The trip over land took twelve days. Most natives started, but some became sick and returned. They arrived at our station singing and shouting. Father Schaefer and Brother Fritsch leading them. They carried those long spears decorated with feathers. They were bejeweled all over with shells as a sign of wealth and position. Their heads were adorned with gear woven with shells and trimmed with all sorts of feathers or wings of birds. They were very lively and much sturdier than our coral natives. Each Sunday they were here they appeared in a body in church in full regalia, but minus spears. One notes their presence before actually visualizing it. They never wash. They rub their skins with pig grease, hence, the perfume. Their skins are nevertheless clean and slick whereas our beach tribes have sores and ringworm. The Fathers said their work was worth more than ten years' preaching."

#### Catholic Action In Japan

The Missionary Sisters of the Immaculate Conception have been doing splendid work in the Far East and now furnish us with the following proof of the efficacy of their labors.

"The mission church in Koriyama," they write, "was almost allied this morning. Mr. Kishida, a fervent Christian who, as tall, thin, some forty workers, most of whom are pagans, conceived the good idea of inviting them to assist at Mass on Sunday. The workers divided in two equal alternate weeks. Theresa, one of them, baptized a few years ago and a real apostle, is full of ardor for her companions; she shows them the pages of the prayers to be recited and the pieces of the hymns to be sung.

"A few of these young girls will assemble here this afternoon, to chat, sing and amuse themselves. We would like to be able to unite a greater number; but unfortunately, the workers of the mission have but one Sunday off every month. Takahashi San, one of those who come here most regularly, was telling us that her companions had manifested the desire to learn the hymn to the Blessed Virgin, that we had taught her, and she had complied with their request; and since then, a canticle of praise to the Queen of Heaven arises daily from these young pagan hearts, amid the moans of the busy looms.

"Now I pray for you, my dear sister, that in her maternal love, she will soon conduct them to her Divine Son."

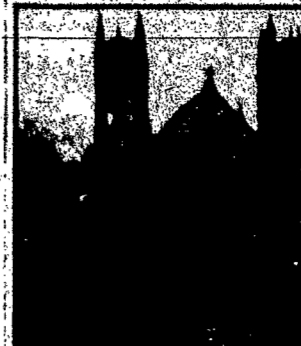
#### FINAL BAZAAR PLANS
