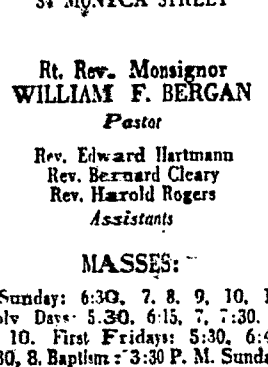

tion plans and meager press reports all Americans have been able to leave Louvain in safety. He said, according to latest dispatches, the last refugees to leave were a group of Poor Clare nuns who were removed in British trucks under heavy shelling but were evacuated safely. Father Ginsburg himself had been studying for the past three he left the University of Louvain and received his doctorate in philosophy just 14 days before the German invasion of the Low Countries.

The plight and suffering in Europe today cannot be tangibly estimated by people who are at peace," he said. Up until the time he left, the University of Louvain Belgium knew invasion was inevitable. The library, restored completely after the "First World War," remained open. "The Belgians hoped, even till the end, that there still was room for reason and peace," he added. All Americans had been warned by the American Consul to leave several weeks before invasion and should they remain they were staying without protection. Dr. Ginsburg tells how the motherhouse of the Sisters of St. Vincent, previously at Brussels, was transferred to Oullix, France. The Father General, the Rev. P. E. Farley, C.S.V., hurriedly gathered together all official documents and the community sent, and journeyed with a small bag for France. Only a lay brother remained.

"The two greatest forces for good in Europe today are the Holy Father and President Roosevelt," Dr. Ginsburg said. "Every courtesy is granted the American passport and all Europe is seeking the moral support of the United States." "The Second World War" definitely has some good features," Dr. Ginsburg observed. "As far as the unbiased observer, an determining factor appears to be a strong religious revival in many of the warring Nations, especially France and England. The beautiful churches of Paris are filled with daily communicants, soldiers, women and children. Sifting the British papers and radio for eight and a half months forces one to the conviction that England is recognizing the Spiritual Force of the Vatican. Their reverence to the Pope as His Holiness, the Holy Father was never heard on the radio or seen in the journals two years ago. It is sure that when the Armistice is signed Pius XII will be a predominant figure and the religious factor will not be ignored as it was at Versailles."

Irish Priest Dies in U. S. Los Angeles.—The Rev. Bernard J. Heany, young Irish priest and assistant pastor of St. Mathias Church, Huntington Park, has just died here. Father Heany was born in Newtonforbes, County Longford, Ireland, in 1906, and educated at St. Mel's College, Longford, and St. Patrick's College, Maynooth.

(Continued from Page 2) help them, and sees that they receive a new start in life. This is an important duty of any such organization as the Catholic Charities. Christ was conceived with the welfare of little children. So, too, must the Church be concerned, and so it is in its program of education, and—in the cases of children who are unfortunate, uncared for, who need help—in its program of charities. But, Father Rattigan emphasizes, the Catholic Church is not in social work exclusively to feed, clothe or straighten out personality difficulties. But principally the unfortunate must learn that they can receive much advantage from a practice of their religion as the fortunate. The Church helps to make up things that are lacking for them, and, primarily, as we have said, is interested in the salvation of the souls of people who are in trouble. As a priest, Father Arthur Rattigan sees the work of the Catholic Charities in this light. "If a priest can better do his job as a priest—and that is to save souls—by aiding the unfortunate people in their material wants, it is essential that he do this. That is the real purpose of the Rochester Catholic Charities." And Father Rattigan along with the other priests and workers of the Rochester Catholic Charities works with their problems and once again the words of Christ come to us: "As long as you did it to one of these, my least brethren, you did it to me."
